The Major-General feels he is mainly indebted for this happy result to your own excellent arrangements and individual exertions; he is perfectly alive also to the devotedness and energy displayed by Lieut.-Colonel Cross, (whose health he sincerely hopes will be speedily re-established,) and to the excellent spirit of discipline and fortitude exhibited by the Officers and men under his orders, neither can Sir George Bingham, while he laments the loss of Surgeon Reid, forget how much is due to the unwearied attention and attendance of Assistant-Surgeon Williams, his successor in charge of the Medical department of the 68th Regiment, under circumstances of extraordinary difficulties as well as danger.

The Major-General requests you will be pleased to accept yourself, and convey to the above mentioned Officers, the cordial thanks on this occasion, and further that you will express to the Officers and men, of the 68th Regiment, the approbation of the cheerful fortitude and high spirit of discipline, that have marked the whole of their conduct.

The head quarters of the 27th Regiment enjoy very good health at Fermoy, and have had no case of Cholera, male or female, since arriving there from this garrison.

A troop of the Enniskilleners, under the command of Captain Radcliffe and Lieutenant Windsworth, has arrived in Cashel.

We have received letters and papers from Bermuda, to the 5th of May last, when the 37th Regiment at St. George's in that colony were under orders to embark for Jamaica, in the Jupiter troop ship.

The Earl of Belmore having been called from the government of Jamaica, a splendid military ball was given to his Countess, at Kingston, on the 2d of April.

Captain Peake, Royal Engineers, sailed from Cork, on Monday for Halifax, Nova Scotia, by the Leonidas transport.

The 83d Regiment is strictly confined to barracks at Castlebar by Lieutenant-Colonel Dundas, and no intercourse allowed with the town for fear of cholera.

The Sergeant-Major of the 19th is promoted to a commission in that Regiment.

The 60th Rifles, in Dublin, have got the route for Belfast. They will be replaced in the Palatine square by the 80th Regiment, now in the Grand-square of the Royal Barracks.

The second battalion of the Coldstream Guards will take up the quarters of the 80th in the Royal-square. They will arrive early in July.

An investigation is about to take place respecting some difference between the Commandant of a distinguished cavalry regiment and his officers. The regiment has always borne the highest character for the excellence of its system and discipline.

Colonel Evans, M.P. for Rye, has given notice that he will, on the 26th of June, move resolutions to the effect, that it is expedient to effect every possible reduction in the heaviest branch of the national expenditure, that of the army.

There was an election riot at Montreal, Upper Canada, on the 22d of May last, when the Magistrates called out the military, and a division of the 15th Regiment, under Captain Temple, fired on the mob, killing three, and wounding several more.

The Yeomanry Officers of the King's County, Meath, Dublin, Westmeath, and Louth, have presented an Address to Major-General Armstrong on the termination of his duties as Inspecting Officer of Yeomanry.

We have received a file of Sydney and New South Wales Gazettes, to the 7th February. Richard Burke, Esq. is appointed Private Secretary to his father, Major General Burke, Governor of New S. Wales. A great number of Irish Convicts have received certificates of freedom. James Raymond, Esq. late of Hollywood, in this County, now Postmaster-General of the above Colony, has published a New S. Wales Calendar, and Post-Office Directory, which is a valuable work to all concerned in the statistics of this great settlement, and the general affairs of the country. The selection of this accomplished Gentleman to fill an arduous and important office is highly creditable to the discernment of Government. The sufferings to which Mr. Raymond and his family were exposed in the county of Limerick, during the peasant insurrection of 1821 and 1822, must be fresh in the recollection of our readers nearer home.

The Corporation of Cork yesterday appointed a committee to prepare an address of congratulation to his Majesty, on his recent escape from the blow of an assassin.

The late Thomas Bourchier, Esq. Deputy Clerk of the Crown and Hanaper, is succeeded in that office by Charles Commins, Esq. of the Irish Bar.

The 17th of September next is the day to which the Munster Assizes is postponed, to commence then at Ennis.

Saturday last Pierce Clinte, Esq. was elected Provost of Tralee for the ensuing year.

David Roche, Esq. of Carass, has become the purchaser of Bartnick, County Clare.

At an Ordination held on the 21st instant, in the Cathedral Church of Kilkenny, by the Lord Bishop of Ossory, the following gentlemen were ordained:—Priests—Messrs. Thompson, Foot, Irwin, and Price. Deacons—Messrs. Lodge, Kelly, Thornburgh, Mandeville, Palmer, and Sheppard. The candidates were severally examined on the preceding day at the Palace by the Venerable the Archdeacon of the diocese, and the Rev. Messrs. Fowler and Darby.

The Rev. Arthur Irwin has been collated to the Prebend of Howth, by his Grace the Archbishop of Dublin.

The Rev. Mr. Forster will succeed the much lamented Rev. William N. Manly, in the cure of St. Peter's, Dublin.

George Hill, Esq. Mayor of Londonderry, is appointed a Director of the Provincial Bank of Ireland, in that City, in place of the late John Rea, Esq.

The Marquis of Donegal, County Lieutenant, has convened a meeting of the Magistrates of Donegal, to consider the present disturbed state of the barony of Enniskillen.

There was a most numerous anti-tithe meeting at Middleton on Thursday, James Adams, Esq. in the chair.

Daniel Moagan, a publican of Westport, and the father of ten children, was stabbed to death on Tuesday by a man who had been drinking in his house.

The enumerators of the population of Ireland are now being paid a moiety by Government, "on account" of their claims for that service.

The Recorder of Waterford has sentenced a man and woman to seven years transportation each for robbery.

The great horse fair of Spanceil Hill took place on Monday, but the attendance was very indifferent compared with former fairs, Cholera, among other causes, having deterred many persons from visiting this great staple for horses and black cattle. There was a good demand for 3 and 4 year old heifers, which sold at fair prices, also sheep, but the show of horses was short and of inferior quality, the demand limited enough, except for light fancy horses, very few bargains were effected, and many horses left the fair, no price at all being offered for them.
