The death among the out cases was Mr. John Kelly,
Grocer—the death of whose mother we noticed in our last.

Among the cases in hospital as reported yesterday, one of
the two cases was a woman who was found in the disease on
the street, and in a state of intoxication. In this state, we
may say, she breathed her last.

WEDNESDAY EVENING.—The reports for the day are
equally favourable—no case brought to hospital.

We have to report the death of Miss Mary Williams,
who fell a victim to the disease this evening. She was
advanced in years, and was much respected.

THURSDAY.—The report from the hospital up to 10
o'clock this morning, is as follows:

Remaining at last report 5, new cases 4, deaths 0, re-
covered 5, remaining this day 4. Out of hospital—Remaining
at last report 8, new cases 0, died 1, recovered 2, re-
maining this day 3. Total cases since commencement of
disease, 259; total deaths, 135.

No cases or deaths reported this day from Clare, either in
or out of hospital.

ENNIS, THURSDAY EVENING.—In Hospital 5, no deaths;
total cases, 259; deaths, 135.

ENNIS, FRIDAY—Only four new cases of Cholera this
afternoon, and one death.

The Earl of Egremont has subscribed £50 to the cholera
relief fund at Ennis, Lord Fitz-Gerald and Vesey £20, and
Sir Edward O'Brien, £10.

Doctors Reid, and Ferguson, passed through here yester-
day for Dublin from Ennis, after attending the Cholera Hos-
pital there—Before departure the Board of Health in Ennis,
passed a vote of thanks to those gentlemen for their profes-
sional services; those gentlemen were paid over £120 for their
services—The Cholera Hospital now continues under the
superintendance of Doctor Charles Keane.

Major General Arbuthnot, who left Castlebar on Friday
for Clare Castle, was attacked with Cholera shortly after
his arrival there, but we are happy to learn that the Gallant
General is now considered out of danger.

On Thursday the Amateur Band of Ennis paraded the
streets, playing several sprightly airs, and some evening
bonfires were made in the streets to mark the general feeling
of pleasure at the diminution of Cholera.

As some persons had supposed that it was Henry Blake
Butler, Esq. son-in-law of Tomkins Brew, Esq. Chief
Magistrate of Police, who died of Cholera at Ennis, we are
requested to undeceive them by explaining it was Robert
Blake, Esq. of Ennis, County Mayo, where his wife and
family reside. He was but recently appointed to the situa-
tion of Sub-Inspector of Police.

Alderman John Vereker, and John Kelly, Esq. are nomi-
nated Deputy Lieutenants for this City, by the Hon. Colonel
Fitz-Gibbon, M. P.

Alderman Thomas Cronyn is elected Mayor of Kilkenny,
Henry and Lewis Anderson, Esqrs. Sheriffs, for the ensuing
year.

There was a meeting at Drincollogh, in this County,
on Sunday the 24th inst.—Brudenell Plummer, Esq. of
Mount-Plummer, in the Chair—which was attended by
some thousands, for the purpose of doing away with tithes.

There was a large platform erected in the little square for
those that addressed the Chair and the meeting. The peasantry
from all the neighbouring parishes attended with
bands of music and flags. The speakers were, Mr. Scully,
P. P. Mr. Reardon, P. P. of Milford, Mr. John Daly, Mr.
L. Hutton, of Dromooligbee.

James Ludlow Stawell, Esq. presided at a great anti-
tithe meeting of twenty thousand people in Bandon last
Sunday.—There was a similar meeting at Charleville yester-
day.

There was a great anti-tithe meeting at Bantry on Thurs-
day, got up by the Roman Catholic Clergy, who marched
before their parishioners into the town with banners of
orange and green. Mr. John H. White was in the Chair.

Captain Geo. Pierce is appointed Inspecting Commander
of the Revenue Coast Guard at Dunmore, county Waterford.

Commissioner Middleton, of the late Navy Offices, retires
with the rank of Rear-Admiral, with a pension of £1,000
per annum.—G. Smith, Esq. the Secretary of the late Board,
also retires upon £1,000 per annum.

At Trinity College the next examination for entrance will
be held on Thursday the 5th of July.

John Sheahan and James Sheahan were yesterday com-
mitted to the County Gaol for the murder of Michael
Keating at Shanagolden.

We stated in our last that a labouring man of the name
of Michael Marrett was stabbed in the Distillery-yard at
Thomond-Gate, by a fellow-workman, of the name of
Patrick M'Namara. The blow was struck with a butcher's
knife, and a desperate wound made between the ribs in the
right side of more than two inches. He was removed at once
to hospital, where he expired on Wednesday night. The
author of this fatal deed was immediately seized, and com-
mitted to prison. He was a jobbing butcher, and the work-
men in the concern had been taunting him that morning in
playful mode, on being appointed butcher general to the
Soup Kitchen for the poor now open in Thomond-gate.—
Irritated at this, and unable to control his passion, the un-
fortunate man in a moment of revenge attacked Marrett,
who he said was the principal in worrying him, and inflicted
a wound which soon hurried his victim into eternity. The
Mayor held an inquest on the body next day at the County
Infirmary—Verdict, Wilful Murder.

On Monday last, in the afternoon, Mr. Theophilus St.
George, eldest son of Sir Richard St. George, Bart., driving
in company with his father's agent, Mr. Madder, was met
within a mile of Shannon-bridge, by a man armed with a
gun, who took deliberate aim and fired a shot, which broke
the arm of Mr. Madder between the wrist and the elbow,
the ball passing through his chest, but not deeply.

Mr. Madder immediately alighted and pursued the assassin, with
whom he came up, and at the instant they each discharged
a shot at the other, but without effect. The villain then in-
flicted a desperate blow with the butt end of his gun, which
broke the other arm of Mr. Madder between the shoulder
and the elbow, whereupon he fell, and while on the ground
received several other blows from his assailant, who was in
the act of re-loading to dispatch him, when fortunately a
man on horseback made his appearance, which caused the
murderer to fly. Mr. Madder was removed to his residence,
Templeview, near Shannon-bridge, where he lies without
hopes of his recovery.

On Sunday last, information having been received by the
Aughrim police, that Kelly, a notorious horse-stealer, who
made his escape that day from the bridewell of Ballinacree,
lay concealed in the woods of Fairfield; they proceeded in
different directions, when one of them, a man named Smyth,
came up to Kelly, and having arrested him, after a long
chase, was conducting him to his companions, when he was
met by six country fellows, who rescued the prisoner and
gave Smyth a most unmerciful beating, having kicked him
in a desperate manner about the head and body as he lay on
the ground. Smyth was armed only with a sword-cane,
which the fellows broke.

At the Ballyhea races near Tralee this week, six horses
started for the £10 plate; the horses were the properties of
Mr. David Gunn, Mr. Burke, Captain Chute, Mr. W. Pope,
Captain Walker, and Mr. Walsh, Mr. David Gunn, of
Lisleton, won the plate, and also a saddle which was subse-
quently ran for.

Two human bodies were thrown on shore near Miard,
County Kerry last week. Some foreign timber had also been
cast on shore on the Western coast, in the same neighbour-
hood.

licet, those for Rathkeale, to Monday the 23d day of July

Union, of Ireland, held at the Corn Exchange on Thursday,
June 21:—

London, 18th June 1832.

My dear Friend.

This will be handed to you by Mr. Clement, who is con-
cerned in the property of the Morning Chronicle; he goes to
Ireland partly on the interests of that paper. I need not tell
you that it has been the able and persevering advocate of
civil and religious liberty. It has not only given the aid of
most powerful talents to the cause of British Liberty, but it
has almost alone constantly attended to the claims of Ireland
to justice. When the other papers neglected us and our rights,
I need not tell you that the Morning Chronicle published
our own arguments, and added the weight of its talent and
authority to enforce them; Ireland owes that paper a deep
debt of gratitude. I cannot avoid particularly noticing the
devotion of so large a space in its columns to the publication
of my five letters; It is not for me to say that those letters
were valuable, but certainly they have been published in
the Chronicle to the great sacrifice of the interests of that
paper, by the exclusion of articles of more immediate ten-
dency to contribute to the entertainment of its readers. You
