The troops throughout the command are healthy.—Colonel Sir Charles Smith, Royal Engineers, is likely to be appointed acting Governor of St. Kitts, vice General Nicolay going to the Isle of France. It is said no changes of stations will take place in the command until the fall of the year, when the transports bringing out the relieving Regiments will perform that service.—The Pallas frigate, Capt. Walpole, and Columbine sloop-of-war, Capt. Live, are here.—Mr. Cavan, the great Army Contractor, died here on the 7th June of ossification of the heart. He has left, it is said, £200,000 in money.

The five Brig Ward, Captain Hare, arrived yesterday evening in this port from St. John's, New Brunswick, in 22 days, with a very select and superior cargo of deals, laths and staves.

John Bouchier, of Baggotstown, Esq. presided at a most numerous anti-tithe meeting in Bruff, last Monday. The population of the surrounding parishes marched into the town with flags, green boughs, and sashes, preceded by Roman Catholic Priests. There were at least 10,000 present, and many wore green dresses. A Policeman taking notes in the crowd was seized, and turned out of the meeting.

There was an anti-tythe meeting on the fair green of Askeaton last Sunday, Capt. John Hunt, of Mantle Hill, in the chair.—The Rev. Mr. Fitzgerald, P. P. declined attending the meeting.

A great anti-tythe meeting at Nobber, County Meath, was dispersed on Sunday by the Magistrates and Military.

On Thursday last the 12th inst. a large party of men assembled near Drumbane, for the purpose of enclosing a commonage, in consequence of which, they were attacked by another party, (who came armed determined to oppose them) with great violence, and beaten off, and on their retreat one of the Rockites fired, and wounded one of the unfortunate men severely.

Mr. McCann has arrived at Carrick-on-Suir, as Stipendiary Magistrate, by order of the Lord Lieutenant.

Thirty-six insolvent debtors were discharged at Tralee, on Saturday—none remanded.

To-morrow an immense number of people are to assemble at Markethill, near Fethard; to bury tithes and taxes; but the chief magistrate, G. Fitzgerald, Esq. is prepared to disperse them.

A public meeting was called at Blarney, near Cork, on Sunday, for the encouragement of Irish manufactures; but the Magistrates and military having interfered, the meeting did not take place.

The freedom of the Corporation of Drogheda has been voted to the Rev. Charles Boyton.

A man of the name of Davern, who lived at Abbey near Tipperary, died of cholera on Monday; he took the disease from a man with whom he travelled, and whose pipe he used; after he used the pipe the owner of it told poor Davern he was just recovered from cholera.

Lord Stopford is foreman of the Wexford Grand Jury, sworn before Judge Torrens.

We are informed that a prisoner, charged with a capital offence, has escaped from the bridewell of Bruff.
