

The Mayor of Cork has invited Admiral Sir Pulteney Malcolm, and the Officers of his fleet, to a grand entertainment.

The Provincial Bank of Ireland has given £50 to the fund for the relief of widows and orphans from cholera in Cork.

The reports made to the Central Board of Health, Dublin, represent the cholera as in existence in Tomgrany, County Clare, in mistake for Scariff. Tomgrany continues free from cholera, tho' within less than a mile of Scariff.

Sir Henry Parnell has no idea of giving up the representation of the Queen's County.

George Atkins and Aylmer R. Martin, Esqrs. are candidates for the office of Chamberlain of Cork.

The Rev. Dean Lefanu and family were driving through the village of Cappamore a few days since, when some wicked miscreant flung a missile at the jaunting car, which struck one of the young Ladies on the face, and broke a tooth.

Stephen Moore, Esq. High Sheriff of Tipperary, has fixed Wednesday, the 8th of August, for the election of a member to represent that county, in place of the present Lord Donoughmore.

The Earl of Llandaff has given £20 as his subscription towards the purchase of a Challenge Cup, to be run for near Thurles.

Henry Winston Barron, Esq. is sworn into the Commission of the Peace for the City of Waterford.

The writ is arrived for the election of a Coroner for the County Waterford. The election takes place the 6th August.

Thursday a publican from Clondalkin, was convicted and fined Ten Pounds at the Head Police Office, Dublin, for refusing a feed of oats for a policeman's horse.

Lord Garvagh, and the inhabitants of Errigal, Derry, have presented an address to the Rev. Robert Alexander, their late pastor on his promotion by the Lord Bishop, Dr. Ponsonby.

A man of the name of McCarthy, entered a house at Courtbrack, in the Liberties of this City, on Monday last, apparently in good health, and after drinking a glass of spirits, fell dead.

Great injury has been done in the past week to gardens and young plantations in the Liberties by a number of idle fellows, who tore down several young trees. Those depredations are becoming very common on the Sabbath, and serious loss has been already suffered in many gardens and plantations. It is hoped the Magistrates will have the Police on the alert to prevent such outrages on private property in future, and to punish the offenders who mostly all proceed from the City.

Lieut.-General Sir John Byng is empanelled on the Grand Jury at Derry Assizes.

The Assistant-Barrister, William D. Freeman, Esq. delivered a most impressive charge to the Grand Jury, at the Killarney Quarter Sessions. His Worship, in most energetic language condemned the illegal combinations now entered into for defrauding the established Clergy and evading the payment of tithes.

Several of the Anti-tythe agitators in Kerry are arrested, and held to bail.

An interesting young Lady, the daughter of Capt. Forde, who had been on a visit at Bundoran, with some of her relatives, fell from a rocky precipice last week and was killed.

Mr. Armstrong, steward to Major Bloomfield, Castle-caldwell, was thrown from his horse, and had his skull fractured, which occasioned almost immediate death.

The house of a man named O'Brien, on the banks of the river near Plassy, was entered by thieves last Sunday, who stole therefrom six pounds in money.

Mr. Kennedy a resident gentleman in the neighbourhood of Cashel is a candidate for that borough under the Reform Bill.

Mr. Feargus O'Connor, of Fort Robert, has addressed the electors of the county Cork, and offers himself a candidate to represent it in the Reformed Parliament, where he says he will vote for a Repeal of the Union.

A Ship-owner who died in London of Cholera has bequeathed £60,000 to the Seaman's Hospital.

John Henry was sentenced at Derry Assizes to be transported for life, for having passed a forged note into the Provincial Bank.

The Assizes of Clonmel will not take place before 23d October.

Twenty prisoners were on Tuesday discharged from Clonmel Gaol, by order of Government, to render the prison more likely to continue in a healthy state. These prisoners had each but short periods of confinement to complete.

He had scarcely concluded his duties, and left his pulpit on Sunday when he was seized with Cholera, and we state it with deep regret and true sorrow, that at ten o'clock the following day, he was a corpse! He was an ardent and zealous attendant at the public hospitals, earnest to give succour to the sick, and consolation to those "who were appointed to die"—and the Board of Cholera never wanted his faithful services. It is said of him, that he indulged in vegetable diet, and addicted himself to a use of the summer fruits—what

On the night of Wednesday, a horse the property of Humphrey Palmer, Esq. was shot dead on the lands of Garryduff, Queen's County, and a threatening notice posted ordering him to give up a farm which he had lately taken from Mr. Stubber, the notice also stated that any person working on the lands should be "burned to ashes."

On the night of Sunday last, the house of John Murphy of Garryduff, was broken into by a large armed party, who beat him dreadfully and stabbed him in two places, he lies in a dangerous state, the inhuman ruffians also severely beat his wife, who is near her confinement, they literally broke the wood work of the house to atoms.

On Sunday last, an armed party attack the house of Mr. F. Palmer, of Derreen, during the time of divine service, and carried off two muskets and a bayonet in good order.

On the night of Wednesday the first day of the Maryborough Assizes, a barn the property of John Keay, of Killidellig, was maliciously burned, in consequence of the people apprehending that the Magistrates intended to use it as a temporary police barrack.

Last week, three armed men went to a meadow, the property of Thomas Kemmis, Esq. High Sheriff of the Queen's County, and beat in a most brutal manner, with the butt-ends of their fire-arms, three men who were mowing at the time.

The Quarter Sessions of Bruff were commenced on Monday before Mr. Assistant Barrister Cruise. The business, civil or criminal, is not of importance.

By the death of Dr. Curtis, the present Roman Catholic Bishop of Dromore, (Dr. Kelly) is now Roman Catholic Primate of Ireland, he having received, some years since, the sanction of the Pope, to act as Coadjutor to the late Primate.

A load of prime New Oats appeared at market this day, grown by Captain Garrett Hugh Fitzgerald, the first produce of the season in this quarter.

Oats are cutting in all directions round Dublin.
