It appears Lord Shannon, the County Lieutenant, omitted his name in consequence of a representation from Robert Hedges Eyre, a most influential Gentleman and highly respectable Magistrate, "That Mr. Ashe was proved to be author of an anonymous complaint against a Magistrate for taking bribes, which complaint was, on full inquiry, proved to be groundless and malicious;" and in consequence of this circumstance Mr. Hedges Eyre declined acting with Mr. Ashe on the Bench of West Muskerry Magistrates. Mr. Ashe denies the accuracy of the statement; but Lord Shannon and the Lord Chancellor have declined interfering further in the matter. Mr. Ashe is Lieutenant on half-pay the 71st Light Infantry.

John Smith Barry, Esq. of Foata, county Cork, has, in the most handsome and liberal manner, forwarded to the Board of Health of Tipperary, unsolicited, the sum of one hundred pounds, after having previously subscribed twenty pounds. The Right Honorable E. G. Stanley also, unsolicited, has given twenty-five pounds, and the Earl of Derby, on application, with his usual humanity forwarded fifty pounds additional. Last night Wm. Higgins charged with robbery, and Michael Fitzgerald, under sentence of 3 years imprisonment for robbery, effected their escape from the City Gaol, by cutting a bar from their window cell.

Yesterday, a Policeman was found murdered on Water-castle hill, Queen's County, a gun-shot wound having perforated his heart. The Sergeant of the Police party and a comrade are arrested on suspicion.

Two of the Police stationed at the Royal Oak, Carlow, are said to have been dismissed for having drunk as a toast, "The glorious, pious, and immortal memory."

Lords Bantry and Berhaven, and the Hon. W. White, have subscribed £20 each to the Cork Conservative Fund.

George R. Dawson, Esq. is canvassing the electors of Londonderry City.

On Saturday, in Dublin, Sir John Byng was sworn in before Chief Justice Doherty, to the office of Governor of Londonderry, and Culmore Fort, and also to that of Deputy Lieutenant for the county of Londonderry.

Major Gallwey, of Ballincollig, who is the chief officer of the constabulary in the county of Cork, has been appointed a Magistrate of the county.

The Western Yacht Club Regatta will take place the 20th instant, on the Shannon.

A Common Council man of Cork, is to be elected by the freemen of that City next Monday, in place of the late Alderman Pope, and a second on Thursday in room of the late Alderman Parker.

Sir Richard Nagle is not only dismissed from the Deputy Lieutenancy of Meath, but also deprived of the Commission of the Peace for that County.

A. Moore Mosse, Esq. is elected Secretary to the Grand Jury of the Queen's County.

On Monday, a meeting of the Church Missionary Society was held at Killarney. The chair was ably filled by the Rev. Thomas Bland, supported by the Rev. Arthur Hyde, and several other Clergymen of the Established Church.

The compensation allowed by Government to the Coal Meters of Dublin will induce a fresh tax on that capital exceeding £4,000 a year.
