Yesterday there were six new cases of light Cholera in
Cork and two deaths.

The Killarney Board of Health, at their meeting held on
Monday last (over which Lord Headley presided,) benevo-
lently determined on purchasing two hundred common bed-
steads, which the Officers of Health for that district are em-
powered to distribute, by way of loan, to the most destitute
and deserving objects.

The Cholera is raging at Bantry, where several deaths
have occurred.

Thirteen persons died of cholera, at Athlone, where the
disease is malignant. It also prevails at Mountrath and
Dromore.

CHOLERA IN ENNIS.

Wednesday.—Three new cases reported to-day, one death,
two recoveries, and under treatment in hospital, eight.

Out of hospital one case reported.

Total cases from commencement, 502; total deaths, 126.

Thursday.—The following is the report of this morning:
—Remaining at last report, 8; new cases, 2; died, 1; re-
covered, 2; remaining, 7.

At Kilrush, one death was reported on Sunday.

Kilfenora.—The hospital in this village is closed, and the
Medical gentlemen have received leave of absence.

Tubber.—There have been three cases here, all fatal.

We received letters this morning from St. Anne's, Barba-
does, and Dominica. In the former Island the Troops still
continue healthy, no changes in the command. The 36th Re-
giment is under orders to embark for Jamaica in the event of
Troops being required there previously to the autumn when
an extra Regiment is to be sent there.

The Commander of the Forces Sir Hussey Vivian, arrived
at Buttevant this day.

Several privates of the 15th and 24th Regiments at Mon-
treuil, died of the Cholera last June.

There is no confirmation whatever of the statement of the
3d Light Dragoons expecting to embark for India.

Captain Forster, late Brigade Major of this district, is
appointed a magistrate of police at Sierra Leone.

The Reserve Companies of the 86th Regt. from Jersey,
under Major Stuart, have landed at Portsmouth, by the Am-
phitrite transport.—The Officers now at the depot are—
Major Stuart, Captains Creagh, North, and Mayne, Lieuts.
M'Intyre, Galwey, and Pearson—Ensigns Wilson, and Ed-
wards—Assistant Surgeon Sinclair, 12 serjeants, 5 drummers,
266 rank and file.

Three companies of the 35th regiment have arrived at
Bolton, to replace a division of the 85th Light Infantry,
gone to Manchester.

The 61st Reserve Companies under command of Major
Annesley have arrived at Spike Island from Derry.

The entire of the 14th Regiment are now stationed in
Cork.

The 63d Regiment at New South Wales, are under or-
ders for India, upon which occasion Major Fairtlough will
be promoted to the second Lieutenant-Colonelcy. The 21st
will replace the 63d at New South Wales.

The inhabitants of Naas have presented to Surgeon Young,
50th Regiment, a splendid gold watch, with an appropriate
inscription, for his humane and disinterested conduct while
Cholera raged in that town.

The flank companies of the Foot Guards marched from
London on Thursday, to encamp at Windsor Park.

A Company of the 32d Reserve from Tralee, attended a
tythe sale at Kilgobbin this week, for arrears due the Rev.
Edward Day, under the composition Act. The cattle were
sold without any opposition or disturbance, before a great
crowd of people.

The number of officers on the effective strength of the
army, Members of the House of Commons, is 30; ten Colo-
nels of regiments, general officers; six colonels, three majors,
eight captains, and three lieutenants.

Major-General Sir Charles Bruce, K.C.B. formerly of the
64th regiment, a fine clever man, was walking down St.
Martin's-lane, London, on Monday last, when he suddenly
reeled about, fell, and was a corpse in five minutes. He
died of apoplexy.

Ireland.

A bill is introduced to Parliament, the object of which is
to have such charitable establishments as are supported by
Grand Jury Presentments, under a board of superintendence,
appointed by the Grand Jury, and approved of by a Judge.
The only Grand Jury not to have this power is the Grand
Jury of the city of Dublin.

Mr. Maurice O'Connell, M. P. Commodore of the Wes-
tern Yacht Club, was off the Cork and Kerry coast this
week in his Yacht, the New Grove, having arrived to attend
the Shannon Regatta.

The Castor Frigate has left the Shannon on a cruise, and
is now at Cove.

The Thetis yacht, belonging to De Courcy O'Grady,
Esq. Kilballyowen, arrived in Cork Harbour on Tuesday
morning from a voyage round the Hebrides. This, we be-
lieve, is the only yacht belonging to the Club that has
made so distant a cruise into the north seas.

There was a great meeting of the Protestant Conservative
Society of Cork, on Wednesday, at the Imperial Hotel in
that city, Lord Viscount Berehaven in the Chair. The
speakers were Robert Deane, Esq. Alderman Garde, Rev.
R. Deane Freeman, J. J. Cummins, Richard W. Becher,
and Joseph Leicester, Esq. The Resolutions appear in
our columns.

R. Otway Cave, Esq. was on Wednesday last, at Clon-
mel, chosen, without a contest, Member of Parliament for
the County Tipperary, in place of Captain Hely Hutchinson,
now Earl of Donoughmore. Mr. Butler, brother of Lord
Galmoy, having declined in his favour—He was proposed
by James Roe, of Roseboro', Esq. and seconded by Counsel-
lor Fogarty. Mr. Cave was not present, nor perhaps aware
of his election.

The squadron at Cove has been joined by the splendid
Yacht of Lord Belfast, the Waterwitch brig, 343 tons, ten
18-pounders, and 45 men. She has on board several dis-
tinguished Naval Officers.

Cove was brilliantly illuminated on Monday night, for the
arrival of the Lord Lieutenant, and the inhabitants have pre-
sented his Excellency an address, praying that it may be
continued as an annual depot.

Since the arrival of the Marquis of Anglesey in Cork har-
bour on Tuesday morning, Cove has been the scene of un-
accustomed joy and festivity. Nine or ten sail of the line—
numerous yachts, and innumerable pleasure boats floating
along the magnificent basin. Thursday his Excellency ar-
rived in the City, accompanied by his own immediate suite,
the Admiral of the Fleet—Sir Pulteney Malcolm—and a
train of Naval and Military officers—reviewed the troops—
received the Address of the Corporation in the evening, and
dined with that Body afterwards. His Excellency was met
by the Corporation, in full robes.—A Guard of Honor, at
the head of which Sir H. Vivian, (the Commander of the
Forces,) General Sir George Bingham, and a long train of
field officers, attended. Thousands of the Citizens were pre-
sent; and the whole exhibited an evincement of marked and
unequivocal regard for the illustrious visitor.

Several of the officers of Vice Admiral Sir Pulteney
Malcolm's fleet, have arrived at Killarney, on a visit to the
lakes.

This day a country woman named Mahony was crushed to
death under a car load of timber which upset near the Lunatic
Asylum. The unfortunate husband of the woman was
driving the car, and a witness to the catastrophe. The
cause of this fatality was a heap of broken stones almost in
the centre of the road.

The Lord Lieutenant has offered £400 reward for the
murderers of Mr. Marum, and £300 for the murderers of
the Policeman near Abbeyleix.

Messrs Lyon, Willis, Tomlinson, and Verschoyle were ad-

day.

Stanley, and Blackburn.
