

chief trade, should Foreign provisions be allowed to enter ships' stores, free of duty—and that the consequent stagnation of trade in Ireland, and the numbers thrown suddenly out of employment, will greatly aggravate the distress and difficulties of this country.

That specific enactments, in regard to provisions, having been introduced by the late Right Hon. Wm. Huskisson, after much consideration and repeated conferences with the Trade, Memorialists considered that this branch of Irish Manufacture—one of the most important of the few remaining to this country—was to continue specially protected; that from the fact of rather an increased consumption of Irish provisions of late in private ships, it is evident that (generally speaking) the salutary regulations introduced by Mr. Huskisson, 7th and 8th Geo. IV. chap. 56, sec. 24th, have proved effectual, and would prove entirely so, had the production of the landing certificate, provided for in the Export Board, been required by the Customs.

Memorialists therefore respectfully submit that positive enactments, remaining unrepealed on the Statute Book, ought not to be got rid of by a tortuous construction of any general wording of the late act—(page 784), 2d and 3d Wm. IV. chap. 84, sec. 48—and that, without any notice either to those whose interests were so deeply involved, or to the members representing in Parliament the agricultural and commercial interests of Ireland—in direct violation of the understanding at the several interviews with the late Mr. Huskisson.

Memorialists, therefore, pray, that the clause in the new Duty Act, whereby the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs are empowered to regulate its operation, may be put in force, by excepting Salt Provisions from the Ships' Stores alluded to—that so the agricultural interests of Ireland, the trade of memorialists, and the thousands depending thereon for employment, may continue to experience the protection of His Majesty's Government.

Mr. James O'Brien was the only passenger of the Aurora tried before the Magistrates at Waterford, for smuggling tobacco from Quebec. The case was adjourned to this day.

At Cove a Memorial has been drawn up, to be presented to the Lords of the Admiralty, for the restoration of the Flag Station and Naval Arsenal at Cove: and it is thought the Memorial will receive the best consideration in that quarter.

The friends of Dr. England, Bishop of Charleston, have had a meeting, and agreed on presenting him with an Address, on his arrival in Cork, and have also decided on inviting the Right Rev. Doctor to a public dinner.

The Stewards of the Galway Racing Club have awarded the racing cup to Mr. Hare, it having appeared to them that Mr. Kilroy's horse did not carry the stipulated weight. One of the conditions of the race being that the decision of the Stewards should be final, Mr. Hare is now in possession of the prize cup.

The late Sir Nicholas Loftus was Lieutenant-Colonel of the Kilkenny Militia, and not of the Tipperary Militia.

Alderman Copeland has given £100 to the poor of Coleraine.

Numerous Notices, in conformity with the Reform Act, have been already served upon the Clerk of the Peace for Cork City, to be returned by him for registration to the Assistant Barrister.

We understand that in consequence of the great decline of cholera, the license for eating meat on Friday, by the Roman Catholics of this diocese, has been revoked by Dr. Ryan.

The master and crew of another vessel, the Three Sisters, arrived at Waterford from Newfoundland, have been committed to the gaol of that City, and the vessel continues under seizure for having a quantity of contraband tea, sugar, rum, and tobacco on board.

Several robberies have been committed in Carrick-on-Suir and its vicinity the last few days. The depredators did not even spare the Convent or Friary.

A riot took place among some country people at the Fair of Newcastle in this County last Monday, when a man of the name of Connor O'Donnell received so severe a beating that he died on Wednesday last.

On Thursday night last, an armed party of men attacked the house of one Ryan, near Thurles, and fired several shots into it. They also left a notice threatening him with death if he did not immediately give up the possession of his farm.

There is a vacancy in the Board of Harbour Commissioners of Galway, by the death of Counsellor John Blake.

At the Fair of Spencilhill on Monday, there was but little business transacted—few lots of cattle were disposed of, and the number of horses disposed of were very few.

Edward Browne, Esq. a Roman Catholic gentleman, was sworn in magistrate of the county of Galway, on Monday, before Alderman Darley, at the Head Office, Dublin.

Mr. James O'Connor was yesterday elected a Collector of rates for the Parish of St. Michael, in place of Mr. John Lyons, deceased.

The Board of Health acknowledges the Receipt of Two Pounds from Mrs. Peacock, Lower Mallow-street, per the hands of Surgeon Lloyd, which has been handed over to the Relief Committee per the Secretary.
