

On Friday evening, the rooms of Lieutenants Browne and Oakley, 81st Regiment in Richmond Barracks, Dublin, were robbed of wearing apparel, sashes, a writing desk, and some silver articles.

By letters received at our office yesterday from Quebec, the 24th regiment continued in good health at that station.

Thomas Brennan, a soldier of Captain Wrights company in his Majesty's 39th Regiment, was shot to death at Dawes Battery, New South Wales, pursuant to sentence of court martial, for attempting to murder the serjeant of his company.

The ship Strathfieldsay, Captain Harrison, arrived from New South Wales, on Thursday, bringing home from thence part of the discharged veterans, whose corps have been lately disbanded; also invalids from the 39th and 17th regiments, as well as detachments of several regiments that have been sent home from India. The Strathfieldsay also brought home a number of passengers, amongst whom were Captain Saumarez, invalided from his Majesty's sloop, Zebra, Captain Sturt, of the 39th regiment, and Lieut. Wolman, the celebrated blind traveller, who has been more than 5 years absent from England, during which time he has circumnavigated the globe, and travelled in Africa, Asia, Australia, and America; but what is very remarkable, Mr. Holman first went to Sierra Leone from England for his health.

We have received letters from our Military friends at Barbadoes to a late date in July, of which the following is an extract:—

"The only casualties since I last wrote to you are the following—93d Highlanders, Surgeon Ekins, who died at St. Anne's; 1st W. I. Regiment, Lieut. Brocklass, formerly of the Rifle Brigade, died at Caponey, Essequibo, on the 14th June, 1832.

"Lieut. General Sir James Lyon, Captain Warde, Royal Regiment, Aid-de-Camp, Lieut. Col. Hay, Deputy Adjutant General, and Staff Surgeon Baird, embarked on board the Trader, Higginson, for Liverpool, on the 21st inst. under a Guard of Honor composed of the Grenadiers of the 36th and 93d Regiments, under Major Rudyerd, Royal Artillery; the batteries firing salutes.—The command of the army in the West Indies now devolves on Major General Sir James Campbell, K.C.B. who will not remove from Grenada.—The frigate Conway, Capt. Eden, touched here, and landed for two days the Earl and Countess Mulgrave, Lord Seaford, Capt. Phipps, Colonel York, and Mr. Sheridan. I send you the Inspection Order of Sir James Campbell, on seeing the 1st battalion of the Royals—

"St. Lucia, July 5, 1832.

**INSPECTION ORDER.**

"Major General Sir James Campbell has been highly pleased with the soldier-like appearance of the head-quarters of the 1st (Royal) Regiment, and with the great perfection in which he has in every respect found them; and the Major General takes this opportunity to express to Lieut.-Colonel Carter his entire approbation of the order and discipline prevalent in the Regiment under his command.

"Lieut. Semple, 86th, is appointed Fort-Adjutant at Antigua; and Lieut. George H. Dalrymple, Royal Regiment, at St. Lucia. The troops throughout the command are healthy. European Cholera made its appearance at Dominica, and though there were 104 cases within nine days, not a death ensued; and the left wing of the Royals under Capt. Cowell are well. Lieut. Colonel Nickle, 36th Regiment, is administering the Government at St. Kitt's.—Major Crosse now commands the 36th Regiment."
