

Saturday morning the Waterloo Steamer, Capt. Cotter, left Merchant's Quay, Cork, with a crowd of fashionables to visit the fleet. At Cove they were greatly increased in number and at one o'clock proceeded to the Vernon, where they were received by the officers with every mark of respect and attention.

Sunday evening, the Jupiter Troop Ship sailed for Plymouth, and her moorings were shortly after taken by the Stag, which will remain for about a fortnight, after which she will proceed to Plymouth to refit, but will soon return.

Thursday last, Admiral Sir P. Malcolm, accompanied by Captain Fanshawe, R. N. and Captain Crouther, R. N. inspected the Royal Marine Battalion in Spike Island. After the Battalion had passed the Admiral in review order, he made a minute inspection of the Barracks; he then walked round by the works of the Garrison, accompanied by Major Park, C. B. the Commanding Officer, and left the Island highly gratified with the inspection.

It is not true that Sir James Graham has accompanied the fleet to Cove. The London Papers of Thursday announce his return to the Admiralty, accompanied by Captain Symonds, from a tour of inspection.

On Sunday last, during Mass in the chapel of Clonfinlough, near Shannon bridge, King's County, an armed party consisting of three, rushed into the chapel and gave the priest a "Terry Alt" notice, purporting that the family of one Egan should be destroyed if they did not leave the country, which the priest read aloud from the altar. Information having been received of this man's family (the Egans) having been visited the night before by an armed party, and the father having been beaten so as to leave his life despaired of, Captain W. Henderson, repaired to the spot and succeeded in apprehending the three ruffians above mentioned.

The shop of Mr. Douglas, of Killenault, Apothecary, and member of the Board of Health which has been established in that town, was entered and robbed on Thursday evening. So great was the love for physic with which the light-fingered son of Hermes was actuated, that he did not leave to the disciple of Esculapius, withal to compound his medicine. Amidst the many melancholy cases of distress to which it has been our lot to call the attention of the Public, during the existence of the awful visitation with which it has pleased God to afflict us—few very few indeed possess such urgent claims as the case of the family of ROBERT RING a Mason. After having been reduced to great distress by many months want of employment, he at length procured work at the Chapel now building in Catherine-street, but had scarcely entered upon it when he was struck down by the prevailing epidemic. He died, leaving a widow and eight children in a state of the greatest destitution. The kindness of an individual placed the poor widow on the list of one of the Public Charities which would have entitled her to a small annual sum, but broken hearted as she was, the remorseless disease which had robbed her of her husband found her a ready prey; and she too has been snatched away from her orphans. The eldest of these poor children who has been long suffering under a complaint of the lungs has been insensible ever since her mother's death, and a few hours must close her earthly course. The unfortunate survivors must look for assistance to those to whom God has entrusted the means of alleviating the sufferings of their fellow-creatures; and as this is a case which need not be known to command consideration, there is no doubt but the Public will come forward liberally on the occasion.

Some individuals who have interested themselves for this unfortunate family, have formed a plan for applying whatever funds the Public generously may place at their disposal, in such a manner as to provide permanently for these poor sufferers.

DEATHS.

On Sunday morning last, at his house in Thomas-street, Andrew Watson, Esq. Alderman and Charter Justice of this City, and Magistrate of the County Clare. A feeling of delicacy forbids us to enlarge on the merits of one deservedly dear to us, many years associated with the welfare of his native City, and long connected with this Paper. We prefer therefore an extract from a contemporary of Monday last, which conveys a just eulogium on his character.

DEATH OF ANDREW WATSON, ESQ.

DIED.—On Sunday morning, at his house in Thomas-street, at an advanced age ANDREW WATSON, Esq. Alderman, for many years senior Magistrate of the City of Limerick, and for nearly forty years in the Commission of the Peace for the County of Clare. This most respectable gentleman served the office of Sheriff in 1796, and subsequently filled the dignified situation of Mayor and Chief Magistrate. In these important offices he displayed a firmness of character suited to the most trying difficulties—a rigid adherence to truth—an anxious regard for the interests of the poor, combined with an uniform principle of integrity in all his decisions, which secured him the lasting esteem and affection of all persons, however varying in politics, or creed. From infancy to the last stage of his existence he resided among his fellow-citizens—a period exceeding seventy years. Mr. WATSON's many good private qualities will be long cherished by those most intimately acquainted with him, and it was in the social and family circles these qualities were prominently conspicuous. His attachments were warm and steadfast; his friendship firm and devoted. Religious and moral worth always found in him an active and zealous friend. Of the House of Industry he was the provident and gratuitous guardian for a series of years. His attention to the wants and necessities of the numerous inmates of this asylum was unwearied, as it was disinterested—his incessant care largely contributed to the comforts of this invaluable institution, within whose walls the aged and infirm, the destitute youth of both sexes, and the pitiable idiot find a refuge and a home. His straight-forward conduct as a citizen and magistrate obtained him general respect, while his many amiable qualities as a husband and father secured him the ardent affections of a numerous family. He died full of years and worth, and on his tomb may with justice be inscribed the summing up of human excellence— "Here rests a good and honest man."
