Yesterday, Patrick Ryan, aged 61 years, suffered the extreme penalty of the law at the County Jail, for the murder of Maurice Connell, of which he was convicted on Wednesday before Baron Pennefather. He acknowledged the justice of his sentence, but declared it was not a premeditated act of his, but the effects of intoxication,—after hanging the usual time the body was cut down, and sent to the County Infirmary. This man's uncle, Patrick Ryan, aged 80 years, was charged as a participator in the above murder last assizes, and acquitted. The trial of Patrick Ryan will be seen in first page. He was attended to the scaffold by the Rev. Mr. O'Connor, and Rev. Mr. O'Grady, Roman Catholic Clergymen.

A vacancy has occurred in the Aldermanic Board of Dublin by the death of Sir Robert Marty, Bart. late M.P.

Jeremiah Dwyer was apprehended a few nights ago near Newport, county Tipperary, for the murder of Maurice Fitzgerald at Emly. Two young lads have also been taken into custody by the Police, who, it is thought can give very material evidence on the trial.

On Saturday last, Martin Commins, Esq. of Oran, and a servant, crossing the bay of Galway, were upset in a small sail boat and both unfortunately drowned. Mr. C. was a gentleman universally esteemed.

An old woman died suddenly yesterday on Thomond-bridge, while being removed from the Englishtown, to Thomondgate.
