A man was killed on the night of Tuesday near Woodlawn, county Galway, by a bayonet wound inflicted by a policeman. The deceased, accompanied by his father and brother, returning from the Ballinasloe fair, were met by two policemen near Woodlawn, who were at the time on patrole -Some angry words ensued, which proceeded to blows, when the deceased, a very able young man, wrested his firelock from one of the police, and gave him a blow with the buttend by which he laid him prostrate, and immediately after discharged its contents at the other policeman, by which he fractured his arm; the other man on recovering himself from the blow he received, drew his bayonet and stabbed the deceased, by which he was instantly deprived of life.
