Captain Sadlier, late of the 94th Regiment, has joined
Don Pedro's army.
Monday last Cornet Croker of the 17th Lancers, returning
to his father's house at Ballinaguard from a shooting excursion,
was wounded in the foot by the unexpected discharge
of his fowling piece, which he carried under his arm,
muzzle downwards.
On Thursday a General Court-Martial assembled at Chat-
ham, for the trial of Captain H. B. Burchell, of the 3d
Buffs, on charges preferred by Assistant-Surgeon Whitmarsh
of his Majesty's Dock-yard at Chatham, for conduct towards
him unbecoming an officer and a gentleman. Next day Capt.
Burchell entered on his defence, until the conclusion of
which the Court objected to the publication of the proceedings.
The sentence of the Court Martial on Capt. Alexander
Gordon, late of his Majesty's Ship Atholl, on the prosecution
of Commodore Hayes, admonishes that officer to be more
circumspect in future in his correspondence with a superior
officer.
Friday an express arrived at the Artillery Barracks Clonmel
for a reinforcement of Dragoons, to march immediately in
Carrick-on-Suir. It was ascertained at length, that there
was a great collection of country people at Moincoin, or
near that village where the young woman who had been shot
by the police, was waking. The Artillery men were ordered
to be in readiness at a few minutes notice.
The troops in garrison at Plymouth are allowed a free
intercourse with the inhabitants, the cholera having entirely
ceased.
Lieut. Macnamara, 8th Hussars, has announced that after
the approaching half-yearly inspection of his Regiment, he
will in person canvass the electors (if any) of Ennis.
The Hon. Robert King, M.P. has addressed the electors of
the county Cork, declaring he can have no reluctance in
surrendering the trust confided to him, as he was always
anxious to promote the peace and prosperity of the country.
Therefore, he again offers himself a candidate to represent
the constituency.
The Protestant Conservative Society of Cork contributed
£400 last week, to the funds of the Parent Society in Dublin.
A man was killed on the night of Tuesday near Woodlawn,
county Galway, by a bayonet wound inflicted by a police-
man. The deceased, accompanied by his father and brother,
returning from the Ballinasloe fair, were met by two police-
men near Woodlawn, who were at the time on patrol —
Some angry words ensued, which proceeded to blows, when
the deceased, a very able young man, wrested his firelock
from one of the police, and gave him a blow with the butt-
end by which he laid him prostrate, and immediately after
discharged its contents at the other policeman, by which he
fractured his arm; the other man on recovering himself from
the blow he received, drew his bayonet and stabbed the de-
ceased, by which he was instantly deprived of life.
The Solicitor-General arrived at Piltown, on Wednesday,
to investigate the circumstances of the fatal affray with the
Police at Moncoin. Lord Duncannon attended, and Capt.
Burke was examined. On Saturday, the learned Gentleman
went to Sligo and swore in the County Grand Jury, when
the assizes were adjourned to the 25th Inst. on account of
the Cholera raging there. Judges Vandeleur and Burton
will preside at the adjourned assizes.
Joseph Leicester, Esq. Mayor of Cork, on Saturday last,
was entertained by the Members of Daly's Club, in consid-
eration of his being President of that Loyal and Constitutional
Body on his appointment to the Chief Magistracy of his
native City.
There was no capital conviction at our City Assizes.
The governors of Carlow Infirmary will elect a surgeon to
that institution the 2d of next month, in place of Dr. Byrne,
deceased.
The Rev. J. Comyns, Rev. S. Fisher, and Rev. J. Potter,
of Trinity College, have been admitted to Priest Orders at
Norwich Cathedral.
The Rev. P. FitzGerald, of Cahircorney, in the diocese of
Emly, has applied for the Tythe Composition Act in that
parish; and the land-holders for same in the parish of Ard-
canny, in this diocese. In the dioceses of Ferns and Down
upwards of 50 applications from as many parishes, have been
received to the same effect.
The Rev. Edward Croker has been obliged to sell several
head of cattle, taken for tythes due to him at Croom, and
the Rev. gentleman has kindly sent in two of them for the
use of the pauper inmates of the House of Industry, and one
to the Mendicity.
Letters signed "Joseph Ady, Circus, Minorities, London,"
have been received by several persons in this City, stating
that they will hear something to their advantage, on remit-
ting him 20s. This impostor is well known to the po-
lice, and he makes a livelihood of such fraudulent com-
munications, by which simple persons have been gulled in
many instances.
