Several of these little ones are now in such a state of nudity, as to preclude their going to the school, or to survive the coming cold, even in their humble abodes, if a generous and feeling community interfere not in their behalf. The Rev. Mr. Enraght, their constant and untiring almoner, is exerting his energies and influence in their favour, but this worthy divine will require the active and immediate co-operation of the public to render his endeavours available. The ease of distress here laid before our fair and amiable portion of society, will, we anticipate, require no further advocacy on our part, the tender sympathies of their own hearts being all powerful, when sorrow touches the chord which we have ever known to vibrate spontaneously to its claims.
