Colonel Bernard, in his address to the electors of the King's County, declares that the present system of tithes and church property in Ireland, ought and must be amended, but with a due regard to the existing interests of the Clergy.

On Sunday, the congregation assembled in the Church of Monasterivan, were thrown into a considerable degree of alarm, in consequence of an express having arrived for the assistance of the police—the house of John Foster, Esq. of Ballykelly, about half a mile distant, having been attacked by a large party, well armed, who carried off three stand of arms, together with a large quantity of ammunition. Mr. Foster, who was in church at the time, immediately departed, accompanied by all the police present—many of the congregation followed. The Rev. Mr. Moore, who was at the time in the vestry-room, putting on his gown, having ascertained that no lives were lost, or other injury done, with the exception of the plunder of arms, &c. immediately ascended the pulpit, and before giving out his text he briefly addressed the congregation, assuring them that they had no cause of alarm, as the police had merely left the church in pursuit of the insurgents. This had the effect of quieting the minds of the remaining part of the congregation. The neighbourhood of Monasterivan is in a most disturbed state;—this is the fifth plunder of arms which has taken place within a week, independent of other Whiteboy outrages of various kinds.

A few nights ago, a notice was posted on Mr. Scully's gate at Kilfracle, near Tipperary, threatening death to any person who would attempt to dig his potatoes.

An armed party attacked John Maher's house, at Brillas, on the night of the 8th inst. and fired several shots into it. They also left a threatening notice, ordering him to give up some land he had lately taken.

The stone piers at the gate entrance to Mr. Marshall's, of Timoline, were wantonly destroyed on Saturday night.

Last week a threatening notice was received by Lady St. George, of Woodsgift, Kilkenny, thro' the post office, ordering her to discharge a laundry maid, and a servant man, otherwise she may prepare her coffin.

STEEPLE CHASE.

The Steeple Chace which was made at the last great Fair of Ballinasloe, for One Hundred Sovereigns, between Capt. Lloyd's bay horse, Mountaineer, and Mr. Caxen's chesnut horse, Monck, four miles, 13 stone each, and which has excited so much interest in the sporting world; came off on Tuesday the 6th inst. in the neighbourhood of Bordsakeane, before the largest assemblage of sportsmen seen together for many years in that country. Captain Lloyd's horse rode by George Smith, Esq. and Mr. Caxen's by the owner. The fences were large and numerous, and taken in splendid style by both horses; when, after a well-contested race, Mountaineer won cleverly. The superior horsemanship of Mr. Smith was never more conspicuous than on this occasion; and from Mountaineer's speed and extraordinary fast fencing, he promises to make one of the first Steeple-Chace Horses in the kingdom. Monck being a first-rate hunter, and having won two steeple-chases, betting was decidedly in his favour at the starting.
