The Chief Secretary says, the Law Officers of the Crown are not aware of any statute to compel the Medical Gentleman to do so.

Sub-Constables Comba, Watson and Anderson have apprehended, near Kilsnoan, James Tracy, for the murder of John Quinlan. The homicide was committed between 3 and four years ago, when the prisoner absconded.

Monday morning, an attack was made upon the watchman employed in guarding Blackwater Mills, near Donass, belonging to Mr. Caswell, by five men who beat him very severely, and would have murdered him had not the domestics of Mr. Caswell, alarmed by his cries, gone to his assistance, when the party fled. They left behind them a sealed letter directed to Mr. Caswell, and signed Madam Terry Alts, desiring him to take back some workmen, whom he had some short time before turned away, or beware of the consequences.

A very reprehensible outrage was committed at an early hour on Monday last, upon some men whom Bindon Scott, Esq. sent up to plough, on the lands of Renneen, beyond Corofin. This ground was taken forcible possession of under the Terry system in the year 1830, and the holders condescended to promise the proprietor four pounds per acre. Having left the land since then in the possession of those *mock* tenants, he thought it time to repossess it, but he seemed to have forgotten that the club-law that deprived him of possession in 1830, was in force in 1832. Accordingly when his servants went on Monday to plough up the land, they were beaten off, and the ploughs broken. Intimation of the outrage having been conveyed to Tomkins Brew, Esq. he lost no time in sending a strong party of Police, under command of Mr. Matthews, who succeeded in apprehending eight of the offenders. The Police are now superintending the tilling of the ground.

A few nights since the hair was cut off the tails of eighteen cows, grazing on the lands of Coolrea, near Tomgreany, the property of Ralph Westropp, Esq.

A military party of the 74th, which was escorting prisoners from Thomastown, this week was followed outside the town, hooted at, and actually pelted by a mob of blackguards. The officer commanding the detachment first reasoned with them on the impropriety of their conduct, but finding them deaf to his remonstrances, at length told them if they continued to annoy the troops he would give them something they would not easily forget. Five of the 5th Dragoon Guards, who were accompanying the party, charged in amongst the ruffians, and put them to flight. One of the soldiers received a severe blow from a stone.
