The fair of Rathkeale on Monday, was decidedly the best which has taken place this season for fat cattle—every forward beast exhibited met a purchaser, chiefly by the Cork butchers—Milch cows, and springers of which there was a tolerable good shew, also brought high prices, and were in demand—Pigs in good request, at advanced prices also.

Mr. Smith, son of Baron Smith, is in treaty for Ballyarthur, in the vale of Avoca, one of the most delightful retreats in the county Wicklow.

In consequence of information received from Tomkins Brew, Esq., C. M. at Ennis, Lieutenant Carey, C. C. P., proceeded on Wednesday, to Cragbrien, and apprehended Thomas Flynn, who stands charged with the murder of Pat Leahy, in April, 1832.

The Queen Adelaide steamer has been chartered, for the special purpose of conveying the Marquess and Marchioness of Abercorn, and suite, (consisting of the Duke and Duchess of Bedford, the Duchess of Gordon, and a distinguished party of fashionables,) from Glasgow to Londonderry. The noble party will proceed direct to Baron's Court, by Strabane.

The Earl of Leitrim and Mr. S. White, M.P. have made larger registries than any landed proprietor in the county Leitrim.

Sir William Chatterton, Bart. is sworn in Deputy Lieutenant of the City of Cork.

The Conservative influence of Cork, General H. Green Barry in the chair, on the proposition of Robert Hedges Eyre, Esq. seconded by Sir Robert Travers, Bart. have resolved to put Lord Viscount Bernard in nomination to represent that County.

The Marquis and Marchioness Conyngham are now at Slane. His Lordship, who is Custos of the County Clare, is in a very declining state of health.

The Dean of Connor (Lord Plunkett's son), will be the new Bishop, much to the disappointment of Dr. Sadleir.

The General Election through Ireland will, it is expected, commence about the 23d December.

Carew Smyth, Esq. concluded the Registry of Dundalk on Saturday, and he is now winding up the Registry of the county Louth.

Counsellor Kane completed the registry of the county Dublin on Saturday—he gave general satisfaction.

The Judges dissolved the conditional order obtained by Messrs. Scully and Lynch, convicted at the last County Limerick Assizes, on a criminal information for provoking Lieutenant Gerard, 92d Highlanders, to fight a duel, on the ground that the Defendants did not make their appearance when the case came on to be argued—the Defendants, however, are to appear on Wednesday (this day) when the case will be renewed.
