Hotel, and was introduced to Captain Green by Mr. Massy,
 who immediately left the room—I said to Captain Green, I
 believe your business and mine admits not of much Prelimi-
 nary. He said he feared so. I then suggested that a meeting
 should take place in the county Tipperary, or in any county
 along the road, between Limerick and Dublin. Capt. Green
 said, Mr. Massy would not meet in any part of the county
 Tipperary, or on the Dublin road I said then, suppose the
 county of Clare; which he also rejected I then asked where
 will he meet. Captain Green said, no where but in the county
 of Cork. I expressed the hardship of bringing Colonel
 Fitzgibbon so great a distance; but Captain Green candidly
 acknowledged, he had no alternative, as these were his in-
 structions, from which he could not deviate; so we arranged a
 meeting as appears as follows.—

We agree, that Col. Fitzgibbon and Mr. Godfrey Masey
 shall meet in the county of Cork, between the towns of Kil-
 mallock and Charleville, on Wednesday morning next, the
 12th Dec. 1832, at ten o'clock.

I lost no time in communicating to Col. Fitzgibbon the
 agreement made between Captain Green and me, and the next
 post received a letter from Col. Fitzgibbon desiring me to
 meet him at Mr. Lowe's, of Spring-house, in the county
 Tipperary, as for obvious reasons, he wished to avoid coming
 to Mountshannon, or the county of Limerick at all, previous
 to the meeting. I proceeded accordingly to Springhouse on
 Tuesday and went from that with Col. Fitzgibbon on Wednes-
 day morning to the appointed place. On arriving at the toll-
 gate near Charleville, (which is at the bounds of the co. Cork) we
 found a policeman there who said he had information that a
 breach of the Peace was intended. Col. Fitzgibbon seeing the
 policeman left his carriage & mounting a horse, rode off a short
 distance. Immediately after Major Maxwell of Charleville, rode
 up with a party of police, arrested me and took the pistols out
 of the carriage. In a few minutes a carriage drove up along
 the road from Charleville, with Mr. Massy and Captain Green,
 who were also put under arrest by Major Maxwell, first, for
 the Counties of Limerick and Cork, subsequently for Ireland,
 and finally, for the United Kingdom—accordingly, Captain
 Greene and I pledged our honors for our respective friends,
 that they would not commit a breach of the Peace—I then
 called Captain Greene aside, and said, that as it was impossi-
 ble the matter could rest there, it would be necessary that he
 and I should have an interview the following day in Limerick,
 to which Captain Green acceded—at that interview I proposed
 that the parties should proceed forthwith to Calais or any other
 part of the Continent, Captain Green chose to select; Capt.
 Green replied that Mr. Massy having gone to meet Colonel
 Fitzgibbon on Wednesday, and as such meeting had been in-
 terrupted, that Mr. Massy would not allow his canvass to be
 to be interfered with, but that after the Election he would
 give Colonel Fitzgibbon a meeting on the Continent or where
 he pleased. I then told Captain Green, that I thought it but
 candid before I received that as his final determination, to ap-
 prize im of the line of conduct Colonel Fitzgibbon was resolved
 to adopt in the event of Mr. Massy's refusing to give him an
 immediate meeting, namely, that he would post him as a Pol-
 troon and a Coward. Captain Green then said that he would
 wish to communicate with Mr. Massy on the subject, but as he
 did not then know where Mr. Massy was, he requested until
 until five o'clock the following evening, at which time or sooner
 if he possibly could, he would give me a reply. At three
 o'clock the following day (Tuesday, the 14th) Capt. Green
 called on and stated that Mr. Massy's determination was not to
 go to the Continent until after the Election, when he would
 meet Colonel Fitzgibbon and give him any satisfaction he re-
 quired, to which I replied, that would not satisfy Colonel
 Fitzgibbon and that I had already acquainted him with the al-
 ternative I think it right further to state, that neither di-
 rectly or indirectly, was any offer made to me on the ground,
 by Mr. Massy or his friend, to proceed to Calais.
