

of Mr. Furlong, returning from voting at the County election, were attacked in the town of Rathkeale, the vehicle was broken to pieces and burned. Only for a few humane inhabitants the Freeholders would have been murdered. Yesterday as two cars and a carriage were on their way in Newcastle to this City, conveying freeholders for Col. Fitzgibbon, the carriage and cars were stopped in Rathkeale by a furious mob, and would have been flung over the edge only for the interposition of Mr. Cussen who happened to be in the carriage with his brother. The freeholders were compelled to confine themselves in a house from any further assault.

The Sheriffs have just declared William Roche and David Roche, Esqrs. duly elected by a majority of votes to represent this City in Parliament. Gross poll, W. Roche 1648, Roche 1285, Mr. Vereker 1105. County Election, this day, half-past 5—Close of the poll, Grady 90; Fitzgibbon 82; Mussy 87; M'Carthy 84.—The contest is virtually over, seven baronies are closed this evening and there are but three, Upper Connelloe, Lower Connelloe, and Costlea, open for Monday the last day.—The return of the late Members is now certain.

Mr. John M'Donnell polled 660 plumpers at the Clare election. A very angry altercation took place between Mr. Steele and Mr. James B. Butler, on the hustings the last day of the election—Mr. Butler, "you were made run from usheen." Mr. Steele, "you lie, Sir." Of Mr. Augustine Butler, Mr. Steele said, if he threatened to bring a mob to Ennis, to interfere with the free exercise of the elective franchise, he was a ruffian. Mr. A. Butler—"You are a ruffian and a liar." The Sheriff immediately interfered, and Mr. Butler promised not to notice the matter.

The haggard of Thomas Ryan of Mungret near this city, as set on fire in the afternoon of Thursday, and would have been consumed only for the police who were patrolling in the neighbourhood. Ryan presumed to vote with his landlord, and hence the outrage.

On Thursday a detachment of the 5th regiment went from Appanore to Cahircorlish for their new clothing, and on their return through Pallasbeg, the country people attacked them, struck and beat some of the soldiers severely, and one fellow seizing a bayonet, stabbed the soldier he wrested it from in the abdomen, of which wound he died yesterday.—The military had only their side-arms, when this savage and unprovoked outrage was committed. A ruffian of the name of Gloster has been taken up on suspicion.

Mr. Wyse is so unpopular in Waterford for not declaring unequivocally for Repeal, that to avoid personal violence a troop of Enniskillen Dragoons escort him to and from the hustings.

At the Waterford Election, Mr. Roger Hayes, the Repeal candidate made the following official announcement:—"O'Connell has the Bill drawn up that is to be brought in to repeal the Union. The Bill is complete; every office in this country is already filled up by O'Connell, from the Chancellor down to the doorkeeper!"

Among the members whose election has been reported to the Crown Office, are Lieut.-Gen. Sir Rufane Shaw Donkin for Berwick on Tweed, and Sir John Byng for Poole.

Doctor Lendrick, was on Tuesday last, elected King's Professor of Medicine, in place of the late Doctor Leahy.

The Monaghan county election commenced on Tuesday. The Hon. C. D. Blaney was proposed by Edward Lucas, Esq. and seconded by Colonel Kerr. The Hon. Henry Westera was proposed by Captain Dawson, and seconded by Mr. M'Dowell. Sergeant Perrin was proposed by the Hon. Dean Plunkett, and seconded by Mr. Jackson. Mr. Perrin addressed the electors at considerable length, after which a poll was demanded, which was to proceed next day. On Wednesday the state of the poll was—Perrin, 374; Blaney, 265; Westera, 257.

It is generally believed that Mr. O'Connell having made his election for Dublin, will resign the County Kerry in favour of his son-in-law, Mr. Charles D. O'Connell, in connexion with Mr. Mullins.

Sir George Grey and Admiral Codrington are elected for Plymouth.

The Singapore Chronicle of May 10 states the death of Lieut. Walker, who was shot through the heart, and died instantaneously, in an affray with the Malays of the Peninsula. The Malays were numerous and well provided with arms, provisions, and ammunition. There were upwards of 200 wounded Sepoys in hospital at Malacca. The 19th Regiment, N.I. have been relieved at Savoy and Mergin, by detachments of the 45th N.I. The 3d Regiment, L. I. had embarked at Madras, June 18, for Vizagapatam, in consequence of some disturbances there. The following were about to proceed for Malacca, to resist the Malays:—23d N.I. or W. L. I. from Madras; two companies Madras European Regiment, from Masulpatam; 40 European Artillery; 50 gun lascars, with ordinance, accoutrements, &c. from Madras. Colonel Taylor was appointed to the command of the Northern Division. Seyd Saban, the heir apparent of the Rumbowe, has joined the English with a considerable force, to resist the Malays. The 63d Regiment was all well, under command of Lieutenant Colonel Logan, at Hobart Town.—The 27th N. I. had marched from Palaveran for Madras.
