

respectable electors of this County. Barton, and the neighbourhood of Bruff, for several hours was splendidly illuminated on Monday night, in return of Col. O'Grady. Large bonfires blazed on the hill and eminence.

Sunday night last, as John E. Langford, Esq. a Magistrate for this County, was returning from the neighbourhood of Knocklong, attended by a party of the 5th Regt., who went to escort some freeholders into town to vote. They were attacked at Hospital by a number of fellows who pelted them with stones, and knocked down one of the soldiers, when Major Smith called out for the Magistrate, and asked what he should do in this crisis. Mr. Langford advised him to shoot any one he saw throwing stones, but not to do so indiscreetly in the village, as women and children were present. Mr. Langford then, with the two mounted Police he had, charged the party that were throwing at them a number of those fellows still continued throwing at Mr. and the Police, one of whom they made a prisoner of, and another hit Mr. Langford a desperate blow of a stone in the mouth; Mr. L. then fired and shot his assailant. Mr. L.'s horse was also struck with a stone in the head. The military party and Mr. L. then marched through the town of Hospital, and as they passed they were repeatedly pelted with stones from the houses and lanes. No further casualty occurred.

Thomas R. Ryan, Esq., of Castlejane, was returning home from the Election yesterday, after voting for Fitz-Gibbon and O'Grady, when a desperate mob pursued the carriage at both ends of the road, near Herbertstown, pelting stones and voicing vengeance against this gentleman. Mr. Ryan was escorted by four Horse Police, who fired several shots at their assailants, yet they kept up the pursuit for six miles, and cut the Police severely with repeated volleys of stones. A reinforcement of Police was fortunately had at Hospital, whose interference saved the lives of the party.

Four men were yesterday lodged in our County gaol, for the murder of the soldier of the 5th Regiment, as stated in last Chronicle.

MELANCHOLY OCCURRENCE.—On Wednesday last, as a respectable and honest man, named John Macdagan, from Newcastle, was passing through the Court House, after being polled for the Hon. Colonel Fitz-Gibbon, and Hon. Colonel O'Grady he received a kick below the abdomen, from some ruffian of the popular party, from the effects of which he died on Friday.

Mr. John D'Arcy, of Clifden, is a candidate for the County Galway on Repeal principles.

Sir R. Keane, and Mr. Galway who was defeated by Mr. Lamb at Dungarvan, are elected for the County Waterford. Mr. Power, one of the former members having resigned on Monday.

COUNTY ELECTION.

The contest for the representation of this County was brought to a conclusion at 11 o'clock on Monday morning, when Mr. Steele entered the High Sheriff's room, where the Assessor and conducting Agents of the Candidates were, and informed those gentlemen on the part of his friend Mr. Massy, that as he saw no reasonable prospect of success, he would not protract the poll, or keep the County in a state of agitation by a hopeless struggle. He earnestly advised an immediate cessation of arms, and he should, on his own part, enter a protest against keeping the poll open longer to gratify the personal vanity of any man. There was no chance in this advanced stage of the Election, of beating down the majority which Colonels Fitz-Gibbon and O'Grady had secured. It would be mischievous folly to persevere in a fruitless opposition on the very last day, when the men of Limerick had neglected their duty to Ireland from the very beginning of the contest, which was looked to with anxiety. On the score of policy, of common humanity he should deprecate unnecessary excitement, and any outrage resulting from this election by friends of the popular party would only aggravate the misbehaviour of those men who had deserted their colours on the day of trial. He was heartily ashamed of the unmanly conduct of the electors of the County Limerick, and his fellow-citizens were not less so.

Mr. Godfrey Massy declared he was willing to give in last Saturday evening when seven booths were closed, and he fully assented to the observations of Mr. Steele, on the impropriety of protracting the contest or endangering the peace of the county.

Mr. M'Carthy followed Mr. Massy, and said he was satisfied to suspend any further proceedings, and let the election terminate.

Orders were now given to the agents in the three booths yet open, Upper Connelloe, Lower Connelloe, and Costlea, not to offer more electors in support of any Candidate, but let the business finally terminate at 5 o'clock same evening.

Mr. Steele then went to various parts of the City, and addressed the country people, told them the election was over, and advised them to go home quietly, and in peace with their neighbours, and denounced any man that would infringe the law.

Soon after the polling had ceased, by mutual agreement, Mr. M'Carthy, one of the candidates, ascended a table in the exterior hall of the Court-house, to address the electors. He was surrounded by a number of country people, who raised a loud shout of indignation on being informed by him of a respectable Roman Catholic elector, who refused three successive applications last Saturday to vote in the barony of Coshma, where the Repeal candidates wanted but one elector to keep the booth open, no matter whether he was for or against them. He refused the most urgent entreaty, and thus the booth was closed, in which they had still a strong force unpolled, and who would have voted this day. He contrasted this with the act of a Protestant gentleman, who cheerfully acceded to their request, and voted in that booth, which a recreant Roman Catholic had shut against them for want of a single vote. Mr. M'Carthy was interrupted by loud cries of "name," and he did give the name of the gentleman, which, however, we suppress, for obvious reasons. Mr. M'Carthy said, that Colonel Fitz-Gibbon's address was before the electors, but what did it convey, nothing. He would admit that Colonel O'Grady, the other member, had done his duty in Parliament, but neither he nor his colleague will declare their opinions to the county on that question of vital, of national interest, Repeal of the Union—(cheers)—and without supporting that great measure they never can truly represent the opinions of the County of Limerick. He knew this fact well, from his own canvass through the country, and no other question occupied the mind of the electors more—(hear, and loud applause.) Repeal of the Union must inevitably bring back the numerous absentee landlords, and compel them to expend that immense income at home, which they squander in foreign countries; and until that Union so destructive to the interests of this country is repealed, we never shall enjoy happiness or prosperity in Ireland. He advised the electors to prepare for another contest, which is not far distant, and muster their forces for the next election. The County Club will exert its energies to promote the registry, for upon that alone rested their power to send members to Parliament who would be the faithful organs of their feelings and their wishes. Extend the registry by all means, and omit no opportunity of securing a vote. The County Club alone was not sufficient; there should be local Clubs or Committees formed in every parish to promote the registry, and when the County is thus perfectly organised by a full and efficient registry, no man can ever succeed in being returned your representative, unless he is the man of your free choice. If you do not so combine, it is impossible to expect you will have any
