*Limerick Board of Health, Wednesday, April 24, 1833.*

As there appeared a difference of opinion between the medical gentlemen who attended here this day, as to the efficacy of the Ponsonby Cholera treatment, and as under such circumstances we could not consider ourselves justified in any longer recommending its continuance at the hospital, without the benefit of the opinion of the faculty,

Resolved—That all the Medical practitioners hitherto employed by the Board of Health, and such others as may wish to attend, be requested to meet, and give their opinion as to the efficacy of that treatment in Cholera, and whether it is a practise likely to be pursued with advantage to the community.

Resolved—That in the mean time the Hospital be restored to its former arrangements, and that Surgeon Franklin be directed to take the management as usual.

The names of the unfortunate victims to Cholera who died on board the Harvey in this river, and which vessel sailed since from this port with emigrants for British America, are, John Mostyn and Eliza Mostyn, his wife, leaving a young family of nine girls; John Donoghue, Mary Ryan, Margaret O'Brien, Bridget Crowe, and Biddy Ryan.—Seventeen altogether were attacked by the disease, of which ten recovered. It is understood that Mr. Bolton, agent to the Right Hon. Mr. Stanley's estate in Tipperary, has made a special report of the circumstances to that gentleman.

At a meeting of the friends of the Mendicity Institution yesterday at their establishment in Henry-street, it was agreed to appoint a numerous and influential Committee of the friends of that Institution, to go through the City and solicit subscriptions and donations from the public for its support, as that useful asylum is now on the eve of dissolution for want of funds.

The Rev. Mr. Adamson has exerted himself very laudably to provide for the maintenance of the local paupers in Ennis, where a meeting took place this week for that purpose. The same Clergyman has succeeded in procuring a grant of money to enlarge Ennis Church.

Monday last, as Sir John Godfrey and the Rev. John Godfrey Day, Rector of Valentia, were driving in a gig in the neighbourhood of Milltown, Kerry, their horse suddenly took fright, and flung both gentlemen with great violence on the ground—the consequence was, that several of Mr. Day's ribs were broken, and Sir John Godfrey was also injured, but not to the same extent.

On Saturday night, the dwelling house of Hamilton Lane, Esq. of Charlotteville, near Clonmel, was attacked by a party of insurgents, and not being able to effect an entrance, they broke all his windows.
