

COURT OF KING'S BENCH, DUBLIN, MONDAY.

The King, at the prosecution of Lieut. Gerard, 92d Highlanders, v. Denis Scully and George Lynch, Esqrs. This day, the defendants were brought up for judgment. The case, it will be recollected, was tried at Limerick assizes, before Judge Moore, when the defendants were found guilty of provoking Mr. Gerard to fight a duel. Mr. Jackson was heard at some length in mitigation of punishment, and Messrs. Bennett and Freeman in aggravation; when, after an address by Mr. Justice Jebb, which appears underneath, the Court sentenced Mr. Scully to be imprisoned three months in the County Limerick gaol, to pay a fine of £50, and to give security himself in £500, and two sureties in £250 each, to keep the peace to all his Majesty's subjects for the space of seven years. The sentence of Mr. Lynch was, one month in the County Limerick gaol, to pay a fine of £20, and to give the same security as Mr. Scully.

Judge Jebb—Dennis Scully and George Lynch, you are now to receive the judgment of this Court,—you, Dennis Scully, for sending a message to Lieut. Gerard to provoke him to fight a duel, and you, George Lynch, for taking that message. Your conduct, Dennis Scully, was most extremely culpable in the very beginning of this matter. You were induced by Mr. Gerard at a very late hour of the night, as has been sworn, in a dress which would not lead any person to suppose you were a gentleman; on the contrary, there was every reason to think you were in a much lower class of life. You appeared in a sailor's dress, engaged in a conflict with another person who also appeared to be a sailor; and Mr. Gerard really imagining both to be of this rank, used an expression in a jocular sense of "Go it my boys." Certainly having the slightest impression that he was then addressing gentlemen. What did you do on this? you wantonly provoked Mr. Gerard and struck him, and he had you brought to the watchhouse, and charged you there. After this, you sent him a message for conduct which you yourself brought about by assuming the dress of an inferior person. Mr. Gerard on this message behaved with the greatest propriety: he refused to accept your message, and thus shewed the true character of a gentleman. In some days after this, you took the unjustifiable means towards this young gentleman to question his courage and propriety, by an unwarranted and unjustifiable attack on him when sitting with several of the officers of his own regiment; but even on this provoked occasion Mr. Gerard continued to preserve the same courage and propriety, and, though a very young gentleman at the time, in the most praiseworthy manner applied to this Court, and got a criminal information against both of you; and when the trial was first had at Limerick you persisted it to go on, but when you discovered that you must be found guilty, you took advantage of a technical objection to the venue; and now you complain of the expense and delay, which was in fact all occasioned by yourselves. The Court, however, has taken into consideration your ill health, and the judgment of the Court is,—that you, Dennis Scully, pay a fine of £50 to the King, and be imprisoned for three months in Limerick gaol, and be further imprisoned until that fine be paid; and that you, George Lynch, do pay a fine of £20 to the King, and be imprisoned in the County gaol for one month, and until that fine be paid,—and both of you shall, before you are discharged, enter into recognizances yourselves in £500, and two sureties each in £250 each, to keep the peace to all his Majesty's subjects.
