Mr. Jackson was eard at some length in mitigation of punishment, and Messrs. ennett and Freeman in aggravation; when, afteranaddress Mr. Justice Jebb, which appears underneath, the Court ntenced Mr. Scully to be imprisoned three months in the ounty Limerick gaol, to pay a fine of £50, and to give secuy himself in £500, and two sureties in £250 each, to keep e peace to all his Majesty's subjects for the space of seven ars. The sentence of Mr. Lynch was, one month in the ounty Limerick gao!, to pay a fine of £20, and to give the e security as Mr. Scully.
