A sad accident befel a poor labourer named John Hawkins, last Wednesday evening, in Newgate-lane, off Mary street, where some old condemned houses were taking down. He was one of the men employed removing the materials, when the main wall unexpectedly fell and buried him under a heap of stones, brick and mortar. His fellow workmen who had a narrow escape, immediately set to work, in order to relieve him, and in a few minutes he was extricated in a deplorable state, head and arm fractured, besides other bodily injuries, from which the blood effused. The sufferer was removed to the County Infirmary, where he expired next morning. The Mayor held an inquest, and the Jury returned a verdict of accidental death. The deceased was a military pensioner at 9d. per day.

Sunday night last an armed party attacked the house of Michael Farrel, at Ballinard, County Tipperary, fired several shots and posted a threatening notice ordering him to give up his farm or he would suffer death. One of the party has since been apprehended, fully identified, and committed to abide his trial at the next Assizes of Clonmel.

Yesterday morning a party of mounted and dismounted Police, under the command of Chief Constable Cote, proceeded from Tipperary to the lands of Glengar, for the purpose of protecting Mr. Hodgings' drivers, while distraining for rent. They succeeded in seizing 11 cows, three horses, and 21 pigs, all of which they lodged in the pound of Ulla.

Thomas Russell, who stands charged upon oath with feloniously firing at and wounding Thomas Heffernan, of Glenbawn, on the 26th April last, has been fully committed to stand his trial at the next Assizes of Clonmel.

A most disgraceful riot and violent attack on the Magistrates and Police, took place at the fair of Ardfert, county Kerry, this week. The Police party of eight attended at the fair, under Captain Brownrigg, Chief of Police and a Magistrate. The other Magistrates present were, Captain Bowles and George D. Stokes, Esq. a number of fellows commenced parading the village, shouting and exciting to riot and outrage. Some of the ringleaders were apprehended by the Magistrates, and a general assault was made on the Magistrates and Constables by the mob, who took up a position in the church-yard, from whence they showered large paving-stones in thousands. Captain Brownrigg was cut in the elbow, Captain Bowles was hurt in the arm, and Mr. Stokes was also struck. Some of the Police were injured. Although the Riot Act was read more than once, and the mob still persisted in the attack, not a shot was fired, and the lives of the infuriated wretches were spared. One of the perpetrators, Cornelius Connor, was secured and lodged in jail.
