On Monday the usual garrison parade took place in the square of the new barracks. The artillery, cavalry, and infantry formed at 11 o'clock, and having marched in slow and quick time by Colonel Brandreth, C.B. commanding the royal artillery in the south-west district, (Sir James Douglas not being on the ground.) The troops then marched by different divisions into the country, and returned to their respective quarters.

Captain Young's company, 83rd regiment, marched yesterday from Kilmallock to Bruff, to occupy permanently, the barracks of that town, in charge of the barrack-master of this district.

The 59th Regiment is ordered to Dublin from Fenniskillen.

MELANCHOLY AND SUDDEN DEATH.—Lieut. the Hon. R. Clifford, 83d Regiment, younger brother of Lord Clifford, died suddenly in the forenoon of Monday last, at his quarters in St. John's Square Barracks, in this City. He left the Mess-room on Sunday evening in excellent health and spirits, and next morning had sent in his resignation a few moments before he expired, wishing to travel on the continent with his sister. His remains were interred this day with military honours, at Munchin's Church.
