DEATHS.

On Friday morning, at Carlow, after a very short illness,
en route from the seat of her father, Colonel Gough, at
Ardsollas, near Fethard, to Dublin, Mrs. Lloyd, relict of
Lieutenant-Colonel Rickard Lloyd, 84th Regiment, who
fell in the arms of victory at the head of his brethren in
arms, near Bayonne, in December, 1813. The unforeseen
death of this very amiable Lady has plunged her highly
respectable relatives and friends into the greatest affliction.
True, she had been in a declining state of health ever since
the death of her gallant husband, still the tender culture of
a young family, the surviving pledges of a fond father's
affection, raised up for her a solace upon this earth, which
nothing but the happiness of a better world, could super-
sede. In every relation of domestic life, whether of daughter,
wife, or mother, her path was a shining light to the children
of men. So high an opinion did the 84th Regiment enter-
tain of the gallant husband of this esteemed lady, that when
quartered in this garrison a few years after the last war, they
erected an elegant white marble tablet in our Cathedral to
the memory of Colonel Lloyd, with the following inscrip-
tion:—"To the memory of Lieutenant-Colonel Rickard
Lloyd, who fell on the 10th December, 1813, while en-
gaged in a successful contest against superior numbers, near
the City of Bayonne, in the South of France—this monu-
ment is erected by the Officers, Non-commissioned Officers,
and Privates of the 2d Batt. 84th Regiment of Infantry, as
a testimony of respect for his valour as a soldier, and of
affection for his virtues as a man."
