BOUR OF LIMERICK.

Government Engineer, who has been employed in a survey of the river Shannon from its source to the sea, he has now just concluded his survey of the river and if his plan, as respects the latter, will be productive of the greatest benefit to the city, and the public should at once sanction its adoption by representations to the Government. And to form an elegant and commodious harbour, capable of affording us at Limerick, a safe and convenient conduit to commercial prosperity, and by a necessary consequence, leads to social benefits and improvements, we trust the efforts of the gentleman who has devoted his attention to this survey, may be rendered successful, and available to ourselves, by the execution of his plan.
