We have repeatedly denounced the dangerous practice of stone throwing in the streets, and have evidence again this day of its pernicious consequences. On Tuesday Patrick Keffe, a young boy, was struck a violent blow by one of those missiles in Roches-street, which extensively fractured his forehead, and the little fellow was taken to Barringtons' Hospital or the City Infirmary with little hopes of recovery. A woman named Jobanna Cooke, from Mary-street, was this morning taken to the City Infirmary, severely burnt in many parts, a lighted candle having fallen upon her while asleep in bed last night. As accidents of this kind almost daily occur, and poor people frequently apply at the Hospital for dressings, a supply of old linen from the charitable and humane would be very acceptable at the Hospital.

Johanna Lambe, an old woman living in Scots Lane, off Broad-street, was sitting by a fire on Monday evening, when her clothes coming into contact with the flame, she was burnt in so shocking a manner that she died this morning from the effects of it in the City Infirmary. The unfortunate woman was intoxicated when the fatal accident took place.

A very fine boy, about twelve years of age, son of Mr. Braxton of Upper Cecil-street, was crushed to death Tuesday evening, at Russell's-quay, between the rudder of a turf boat and a heavy lighter.

The Lord Chancellor of England has dismissed the petition of the Hon. James King and others, praying the appointment, in England, of committees of the estates and person of the Earl of Kingston, and has granted the petition, presented by Mr. Scollard, on behalf of Lord Kingsborough, praying that the transcript of the inquisition should be transmitted to Ireland, for the purpose of appointing committees of the estate under the Irish Court of Chancery.

Wednesday, at Petty Sessions, Patrick Drury, an apprenticed servant, was discharged from his employ by Edward Sayers, Esq. for allowing bottles to be stolen from his master. Informations were ordered against John M'Carthy for stealing from Mr. Bennett Kelly's in George's-street, and also against several persons at Ballyvarra, for taking illegal possession of ground, the property of Mr. Farrell.— Two young boys, who had no fixed residence, were sent to the House of Industry for one month, for stone throwing; and as that offence has become so general in town, the magistrates have determined to send all transgressors to severe labour at the treadmill, and accordingly eight were this day sentenced to a month's exercise on this machinery.
