

On Monday last an interesting child of four years, Bridget Butler, was playing on the Ennis-road near the Mayor's Stone, when a heavily loaded car approached and passed over the little creature, who was killed on the spot. She was the only child of a widowed mother.

On Monday morning, an armed party, about forty in number, assembled near the Well of Kiltteely, in this county. Constable Daniel O'Brien, stationed at that post, having got information, instantly proceeded with a party of Police, 14 in number, when on their approach the insurgents fled in different directions. The Police pursued, and in the chase Sub-Constable James Ryan apprehended two of them, one of whom had a parcel of slugs cut in his possession. The two persons are lodged in the County Gaol.

The fair of Hospital on Monday was disturbed by the irruption of an armed faction who fired several shots. All quiet and respectable persons immediately quitted the fair, where the usual bargains were soon put an end to by those violent ruffians. The leader of the faction was a man of the name of Hayes.

Sergeant Hayes, of the Kilmallock Constabulary, and the Police of the different stations under his command, have taken up eight stand of arms, at Maidenhall, in this County, which he lodged in Mr. Vokes' office this day, under the directions of Chief Constable Fitzpatrick; and has also lodged in the County Gaol, Daniel Holmes, charged with having attacked the house of Mr. Robert Maxwell, and firing into said house and wounding one of the inmates,—and also Denis Quin, Maurice Quin, and Bartholomew Bresnahan, charged with the murder of Michael Sullivan in the late affray at Maidenhall in this County. Too much praise cannot be given Sergeant Hayes for his efficiency in discovering two muskets heavily loaded concealed in a corn-binn at Maidenhall.

Some infamous person threw a large stone about 8lbs weight through the Chief Magistrate's (Captain Willecks) window at Tipperary, on Saturday night last.
