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Captain Allman, of Eyrecourt, is appointed a Commissioner of Tythes near Mallow.

The Peace Preservation Police in the county Clare, has been further reduced during the past week, thirteen men having been drafted to other Counties.

The Chief Magistrates, Chief Constables, Constables, and Sub-Constables of the County Tipperary, (in all 581 men) cost that County the annual sum of £23,480, being 40l. 8s. 2d. per man.

The Dublin Register assures Mr. Secretary Littleton, that in the last Treasury account of the Irish debt, there is a mistake of no less than 24 millions sterling.

Patrick Barry received a blow of a stone in the forehead on last Saturday evening, which caused a fracture; but not being aware of the serious nature of the injury, he neglected applying for advice until the Tuesday after, and in the interval indulged freely in drinking spirits. He was brought to Barringtons' Hospital early on Thursday morning in a state of furious delirium, where he received immediate attention, but no skill could retard the fatal event which was evidently approaching. He died yesterday at one o'clock. He had been in a row at the Potatoe Quay on Saturday evening, and there got the blow. A mason of the name of Flynn was yesterday apprehended as a principal in this fatal business.

In a former Paper we stated the attack on Mr. Smyth, of Ross Park, whilst setting his meadowing at the Inches on the 5th ult. and now have to mention that in consequence of his not complying with the wishes of midnight legislators, his meadowing remained uncut, and not a mower could he procure at any price to cut them, though he has for the last 18 years given employment to a number of poor people. He was under the necessity of sending thirty miles off to the neighbourhood of Newport, where he procured a number of mowers who were escorted to the residence of Mr. S. and from thence to the meadows by a party of Police,—when after cutting about 12 acres, the people from the adjacent neighbourhood flocked in and took the meadowing cut and uncut at the prices named by Mr. S. Too much praise cannot be given to Jonathan Willington Walsh, Esq. of Walsh Park, as a Magistrate, for his spirited exertions and attention on this occasion, and also to Mr. Malone, Chief Constable, of Borrisokane.

Friday evening a diabolical murder was perpetrated in the neighbourhood of Churchtown, near Ardee. The victim of this outrage was an inoffensive young man, named Sharkey, a respectable farmer, renting a large tract of land. It appears the perpetrators of the murder are a family named Finegan, who resided in the same bawn, as it is termed with the Sharkeys. The Finegans wished to stop up a pass on the farm, which was opposed by the Sharkeys—and this has been in contention between the two families. On Friday last the deceased went to Dundalk, and during his absence the Finegans built a turf clamp against the pass. When young Sharkey was informed of what had occurred, he went out to speak to the Finegans, who immediately pounced on him, dragged him across the wall, and continued beating him until they deprived him of life. There were no less than thirteen at this savage attack; the poor fellow was literally beat into a jelly. Two of the principals have made off, the servant boy and the maid servant of the Finegans.

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
