

Messrs. Palgrave and Logie as Commissioners on behalf of the Crown, arrived in Drogheda on Tuesday, for the purchase of such Irish leaf tobacco as should be surrendered for sale and valuation. The total quantity on hands, in the extensive excise collection of Drogheda, only amounted to 17,031lbs. of which about 12,000lbs. were sent to the King's stores, where, after the usual examination the several lots were classified, and the tobacco consigned to the flames.

The last Dublin Gazette is full of proclamations offering rewards for the authors of various outrages. £100 for the principals in a mob that attacked Mr. Collam, a tythe commissioner near Dundalk, and destroyed his papers. 150l. for the murderers of Archy M'Grane, near Rathfriland.— 50l. for the incendiaries who burned the out-offices of John Dunne, at Rahanoule, Queen's County, a tenant of Lord Lansdowne, and 50l. for the murderer of John Shaughnessy, at Clonslanor, Roscommon.

Monday evening last John Campbell, servant man of Dr. Sayers, while standing on the sill stone cleaning the windows of his master's house in Upper Cecil-street, lost his hold, and fell down upon the upright iron bars on the flagway, when one of the spikes pierced the flesh under the arm, and came out over the shoulder. He was conveyed to Barrington's Hospital, where his recovery, notwithstanding the serious hurt he got, is expected.

Daniel Molloy, an old man, who was abandoned by his relatives, perished of cold and starvation in a ditch near Maryborough, on Friday night!

A young man named Meehan, died on Saturday in the Ennis Infirmary. He received a blow of a hurley on the head, in a hurling match on Sunday. The consequence was the loss of the man's life.

The Cholera still lingers at Kilrush, and since the 19th of last month there have been 90 cases, 55 deaths, 24 recoveries.
