Saturday an inquest was held at Barrington's Hospital, by  
 the Mayor, on the body of John M'Namara, a labourer,  
 who was killed by a stab of a bayonet, which he received on  
 Wednesday night last in Boherbuoy—after a Jury being  
 sworn the following witnesses were examined:—

James Gallagher, a labourer, who worked in the same  
 concern with deceased, on being sworn stated, that himself  
 and the deceased were returning from their work, about 7 or  
 8 o'clock on the above evening; that they saw a fight on the  
 road; witness asked what was the matter, and was told that  
 it was some of the 28th soldiers, and the vagabonds of the  
 road, that were fighting; witness said to deceased, go home;  
 immediately on looking back, he saw two soldiers run-  
 ning towards them with drawn bayonets, on which he and  
 deceased ran off towards their homes—but the deceased be-  
 ing a feeble man was overtaken, and he believes stabbed—  
 there was a crowd at the corner of the lane, where they ran  
 after witness—swears distinctly that the soldiers belonged to  
 the 28th regiment—did not see the man stabbed—witness  
 was pursued to his own door by the soldiers, who made  
 a stab at him, which he put off by shutting his door—went  
 to the window and saw one of the soldiers stab James Walsh  
 (a pensioner) in the arm, who was standing at his own door  
 and run off—Walsh's wife followed them—on coming out to  
 his door he heard that M'Namara was stabbed by a soldier—  
 heard the soldier say, that they would not spare man, wo-  
 man, or child—would not know the soldiers—on his oath  
 neither he or M'Namara gave any provocation.

James Walsh deposed to having received a bayonet wound  
 in his arm, but did not know the soldier; he saw the sol-  
 dier run into a public-house, and the door shut out; did not  
 see the deceased stabbed; did not know the soldier that  
 stabbed him; saw the guard take the soldier prisoner out  
 of the house.

Daniel Roche stated, that he was going home with a  
 hurly, and on one of the soldiers stooping near him, he  
 struck him with it on the head, which knocked him down,  
 and ran off.

Here Colonel Hailes handed a deposition to the Mayor, of  
 one Davison, a soldier, which stated that he was most bar-  
 barously used on the same night, and was at present in a  
 very dangerous state in hospital, having been knocked down  
 and pelted with stones. The jury after some discussion, re-  
 turned a verdict to the following effect:—"That the de-  
 ceased came by his death in consequence of a bayonet  
 wound which he received from a soldier of the 28th regt,  
 unknown."
