On Tuesday night, at his father's house, John, eldest son of Villiers Peacocke, Esq. of Dooneen, in this County.— The death of this gentleman, who was in the bloom of manhood, and endeared to his relatives by his goodness of disposition, and the high sense of honor which ever influenced his conduct, has plunged his family in the deepest affliction. By them he was justly looked up to as the pride and ornament of their domestic circle; while his engaging manners and many accomplishments rendered his society sought after by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. Few, indeed, at his early period of life possessed the various acquirements by which he was distinguished, his active mind, having left scarcely any department of knowledge untried, and the eminent talents that nature had bestowed on him, enabling him to attain a proficiency in whatever he attempted.
