THE LATE LORD BISHOP OF LIMERICK.

We transfer to our columns from *The London Morning Post* of Wednesday, the following notice of this excellent Divine, which appeared in our second edition last post:—

“Died, on Monday last, at East Hill, Wandsworth, in the 59th year of his age, after a long illness, the Right Rev. John Jebb, D.D. F.R.S. Lord Bishop of Limerick, Ardfert, and Aghadoe. For nearly seven years he had suffered under the effects of a violent paralytic seizure, which compelled him to withdraw from the more active duties of his see, and to reside in this country for medical advice. But his mind survived his body; and, while an invalid scarcely able to move about his room, even with assistance, he continued an anxious and watchful care over his diocese; and employed the hours of langour and sickness in the preparation and publication of works, original, or those of other great divines, for the benefit of the church of Christ. In private life, he was among the most amiable and beloved of men, with a singular faculty of attaching all of every age to him; in literature he was among the most distinguished Biblical scholars of the age—and in personal humility and piety he was worthy of his office as a Christian Bishop.”

The remains of the lamented Lord Bishop of Limerick were interred at Clapham Church-yard, Surrey, on Monday.

The revenue of the Episcopal See of Limerick, Ardfert, and Aghadoe does not exceed £5,000 a-year. Among the Clerical Gentlemen spoken of as likely to succeed to the vacant mitre are the following—Hon. and Rev. Mr. Plunket, a son of the Lord Chancellor, Archdeacon Torrens, Rev. Mr. Brownlow, Drs. Sadler and Lloyd, of Trinity College. We presume, without going out of the Diocese, a fit and proper successor might be easily found amongst the resident Clergy.

The Prebend of Athnett, the parishes of Kilquane, Ardpatrick, Killmaley, and the non-cures annexed to the Bishoprick of Limerick are to be disunited from it, and the revenues arising therefrom placed at the disposal of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners.

His Grace the Archbishop of Dublin, has collated the Rev. Fielding Ould, of Rathmore, to the Vicarage of Killeel.

The Rev. Arthur Herbert has definitively accepted the living of Killarney, in the gift of Lord Kenmare, vacant since the Rev. Mr. Hyde's death. The former Clergyman had for some time declined the offer.
