Mr. William Daly, of the North Strand, was found drowned yesterday morning in the rere of the City Gaol, and adjoining the County Court-House. The Mayor held an inquisition upon the body, but nothing whatever was elicited in evidence beyond the fact of a woman's exclamation at a late hour of the night, that a man was drowning, which alarmed the neighbourhood of Merchants-Quay, and assistance was after some delay got, but the vital spark had fled, some hours before the body was raised. Surgeon Franklin proved on the inquest that the deceased did not exhibit any marks of personal injury, and that he died of suffocation by immersion in the river. Robert Robertson, of Merchants-Quay, deposed, that he heard the cry of a female voice, and searched along the Quay side with the watchman, until they discovered the body. Mr. Daly was then quite dead. Verdict of the Jury—Found drowned.—The deceased was a remarkably able young man, and had dined in town the evening before.

Last Saturday we described an awful fatality, by fire, in the cabin of a poor man named Egan, at Herbertstown, in this County, when three of his little children perished in the flames, while the father and mother, with surviving child, escaped from the conflagration, severely burned. The mother and her little boy were admitted into the County Infirmary for treatment, but the latter died of the injury he endured on Monday morning, thus adding a fourth victim to the shocking catastrophe. The Mayor held an inquest on the body of the child yesterday, and a verdict was returned agreeably to the circumstances of the accident. Poor Egan's habitation was burned to the ground, his wife still lingers in a dangerous state, and his case is one peculiarly deserving of commiseration and relief.

The weather for some few days past, has assumed a very harsh and wild aspect—Saturday, Sunday and Monday, severe hail showers, and a partial fall of snow, with a piercing cold wind.

The Lord Lieutenant has offered a reward of £100 for the murderers of John Connell, blacksmith, at Manister, in this county, and £100 for the supposed murderers of Michael M'Namara, whose body was found near the Sallygrove, in the Abbey river, last month.

A man named Doyle was taken a few nights ago in the county Wexford, concealed in a chimney, for the murder of Joyce, of Ballyogan. Three men have already been hanged for the murder.

On Sunday night last a party of armed ruffians attacked the house of a man named Dwyer, at Dogstown, near Cashel; they effected an entrance through a window, and dragged Dwyer outside the door, placed him on his knees and but for the interference of one of the party, would have shot him. Dwyer recognised one of them in Cashel on Tuesday last, and by the aid of the police had him lodged in Jail. Dwyer is herdsman and driver to Mr. Stotesbery of Eathard.
