On Sunday, in Castle-street, where he resided and industriously worked at his trade for upwards of fifty years, Mr. Benjamin Keith, nailer. He was an active member of the Irish Volunteers in the year 1782, and evinced at all times, when the state of the country required his services, the most ready and willing disposition to be engaged in any loyal undertaking. At the period of the Whiteboy disturbances in the County Limerick, about the year 1790, he marched at the right of the grenadier company of the 34th Regiment from this Garrison under Captain Forbes of that corps, and behaved in the most gallant and soldierlike manner at what was then called "the Battle of Bruff." He received the thanks of the Magistrates for his spirited exertions on that occasion. Mr. Keith was a very able-bodied man, stood over six feet three inches, and, when dressed in his Volunteer uniform, was a very fine-looking soldier.
