

In the parish of Burrishoole an the Rev. Mr. Stoney's claims were confirmed. The Rectory of Charleville, in the diocese of Cloyne, vacant by the death of the Rev. We are gratified to learn that Dr. Ryan, Roman Catholic Bishop of this diocese, who was seriously ill the last few days, is now pronounced convalescent, to the great satisfaction of all his fellow-citizens.

Thursday evening last, an afflicting casualty occurred at Arthur's-quay. A fine little girl, six years of age, daughter of Mr. Thomas Spellicy, sliding on the staircase banister, fell over the railing down two flight of stairs, and the little creature was so dreadfully hurt, that death terminated her sufferings in a few hours after.

John Connell, a labourer, at work in a quarry at Boher-
buoy, was so badly hurt yesterday in the chest and hand by the sudden fall of a weighty stone, that he died in an hour after in the City Infirmary.

On Wednesday last, a man named John Shea, about thirty years of age, was taken into Barrington's hospital from Mungret, in the liberties of Limerick, labouring under all the awful and distressing symptoms of hydrophobia. It appears that on last Shrove Tuesday morning as he was returning home from a wedding, he was bit by a dog in a rabid state, in the calf of the leg. He took no further notice of the wound which healed up, until a few days since, when he felt a most acute pain shooting from the thigh down to the part where he received the bite; the pain continued, and, on Tuesday last, when about taking a drink of ale, he received as if a sudden shock, and let the vessel fall out of his hand. From that moment, the most frightful symptoms of the complaint increased, and the poor fellow was completely unable to take any further drink, although complaining of severe thirst. When even shewn any liquid, particularly water, he was seized with the most violent paroxysms. On being admitted into hospital, he had sixty ounces of blood taken from his arm and a vapour bath given him which, though mitigating his sufferings, did not check the progress of the disease. The unfortunate man, after lingering in the greatest torture, expired at eleven o'clock yesterday.
