THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 9.

On Sunday last, a man named Darby Curtin, was killed by a blow of a spade, at Abbeyfeale, in this County, by Mr. John Harnett, of Bridgmount, who surrendered himself to John Raymond, Esq. of Riversdale, a Magistrate, for trial.

The *Breeze* which conveyed passengers from this port returned here yesterday from Quebec, after a pleasant passage of 28 days. The arrival of the *Thetis* may be looked for in about ten days. By the *Breeze* we have been favored by Mr. Spaight with Quebec papers to the 6th ult. They reiterate an account of the loss of the vessels from this harbour—the *Fidelity*, from Dublin for Quebec, with 150 passengers, was wrecked on the 10th May; crew saved.—The Emigrant tax of 10s. is repealed—8,251 emigrants arrived from Ireland and England at New York between the 1st and 28th May.

Thomas Enraght, the carpenter of the *James*, arrived yesterday in the *Breeze*; and Lawrence Magrath, carpenter of the *Proselyte*, has returned in the *William*. Their most providential escape from the wrecks of these vessels has been already noticed in our publication.

The ship *Albion* and *Maria* have arrived at Quebec from Tralee; the former conveyed 182 settlers, many of them Protestants from the County Limerick.

Monday, Colonel O'Halloran arrived from Lemington at the house of his brother-in-law, Michael Gavin, Esq. in this City.

The 14th foot may expect to move shortly from Athlone.

The departure of the 27th Regiment, under Lieut.-Colonel Hare, C.B. from Enniskillen is much regretted. The excellent conduct of both officers and privates procured them the esteem of the inhabitants of that respectable vicinity.

The service companies of the 47th embark about the 7th August, from Dublin, for Gibraltar, on board the *Jupiter* troop ship, which will then bring on the 60th Regiment, Malta
