An undeviating rectitude of conduct-a genuine sense of honour, truth, and candour-a sterling uprightness and integrity of purpose, which nothing could tempt her to compromise-an innate principle of benevolence at once liberal and unostentatious, the natural result of a good heart and expanded mind-a clearness of judgment, and prudent course of action, surprising to behold in so young a creature—all combined to form a character, which from its own pure elements exercised the most beneficial influence around, and may still speak from the grave with the salutary voice of example. These virtues were not (how could they be?) unaccompanied by the still more endearing grace of domestic life. In her private circle she was distinguished for the most ardent and generous affections, and for firm and animated friendship. Her temper was placid and serene. Her disposition open, ingenuous, and confiding. Her manners, artless, kind, and engaging. Her conversation, agreeable and full of instruction, and her reelings so little selfish that they were ever directed towards the wants and wishes of others, and so susceptible as to be always ready to sympathise in their sorrows and their joys.
