General's Office, Barbadoes, 1834.

I will sail hence on Thursday, 13th inst. for Nevis, St. Kitts, and other companies of the 67th and 36th Regiment, at the two companies of the 65th Regiment, to return to the Garrison of Antigua.—The

Barbadoes, 17th June, 1834.

I received from the Major-General that the troops will parade in Antigua as to be formed in square of twelve precisely, for the execution of sentence of death on the 26th inst. for Bridgetown, upon the 26th inst. In the afternoon of Saturday last, a small party of the 91st regiment were returning to barracks in this garrison from detachment in Tipperary, under the command of a corporal, when private John Goold, became intoxicated on the march, and in a fit of passion supposed to arise from a jealousy of a young woman, loaded his firelock with ball cartridge about a mile at this side of Cahirconlish, and fixing the muzzle of the gun in his mouth, struck the trigger with his foot, upon which the contents exploded in his head, and caused instantaneous death. This revolting deed was perpetrated some perches in advance of the party, and without the cognizance of the Corporal in charge, who is to be brought to Court-martial for neglect of his duty. The spectacle the deceased soldier presented on the road was most appalling.

Major Slade, who is an excellent disciplinarian, then formed line, and with open ranks ordered a general salute, the band playing "God save the King," which concluded with the troops giving three hearty cheers to the Earl and Countess of Mayo and their company, with an addition of "one cheer more." The officers and soldiers then proceeded to Naas, highly delighted with the reception they experienced at this hospitable mansion.

Lieut.-Colonel Arbuthnot, of the 90th Light Infantry, has proceeded to England on leave of absence, and the command of the regiment at Naas, has devolved on Major Mackay.
