Sandown Barracks, in the Isle of Wight, pleasantly situated, and commanding a view of the sea beyond St. Helen's and Brading Bay, have long been useless as regards accomodation for soldiers; but instead of being unoccupied, they are let out in tenements, and many of them are converted into shops.

So many cases of admission to the new City Infirmary since Friday evening last, have not been recorded upon the books since its completion. The subjects have in every instance received cuts, contusions and broken heads, originating in riot and intoxication. The wards of the Hospital are all full.

Patrick Curtin, a countryman, returning home from market on Saturday evening, was attacked by several persons near Boher, who pelted him with stones, and stabbed him with a pitchfork, of which wounds he died in the County Infirmary, on Monday. His head was very badly fractured, and a sharp stone actually wedged into it. The iron prongs of the pitchfork had injured the heart and lungs. The Mayor held an inquest on the body—Verdict of wilful murder against four persons, not yet in custody.

Patrick Glinnane, of Monaleen, in the Liberties of this City, descended a well at Peafield, on Monday last, from which a pump was drawn up for repair. Overcome by the foul air, he remained insensible at the bottom, and, when taken up with some difficulty, he was removed in a lifeless state to town, and expired in the City Infirmary next morning. Two others had nearly shared a similar fate in attempting to bring him out of the well, by exposure to the foul air.

An unfortunate girl of the town, name unknown, was conveyed from a ship in port to the City Infirmary on Monday night, about nine o'clock, in a state of total insensibility, and expired in two hours after. Reports says her name was Harnett, a native of St. Finbar's, Cork.

On Monday, at the Police-office, Patrick Magrath was sentenced to a month's imprisonment or a fine of fifty shillings for assaulting Mr. John Tyrrell Baylee in the streets. John Connors and John Manix were fined 50s, each or a month's imprisonment for abusing the Rev. Mr. O'Grady, and Mr. Wm.
