The County Magistrates assembled at Quarter Sessions  
yesterday appointed ten men of good character and active  
habits to the Police establishment of this district, in place  
of the like number superannuated.

James Bennett, Esq. coroner, held an inquest this week at  
Kilmallock, upon the body of Maurice Finn, who was barba-  
rously murdered in that town last Sunday, as related in the  
*Chronicle* of Wednesday. The jury returned a verdict of  
wilful murder against a desperate character of the name of  
Condon, who has for the present eluded justice.

William Ryan, who was employed by a farmer named  
Kirwan, from Tipperary, to make sale of 18 bags of oats,  
for which he got £15 at the distillery, and then absconded  
with the money, has been arrested at Liverpool, and is now  
on his way from Dublin to Clonmel gaol.

The houses of two brothers named Kelly living at Ballykely,  
Kilkenny, were last week attacked by an armed party  
of Whitefeet, who fired in and wounded Edmund Kelly  
with slugs. A servant woman received a ball in the thigh,  
and the brother, Malachy Kelly, was dreadfully beaten by  
some of those blood-thirsty ruffians.—On the night of the  
17th inst. about 100 loads of turf, the property of a man  
named Purcell, living near Castlecomer, were maliciously set  
fire to, and burned. Purcell was suspected of giving infor-  
mation against the Whitefeet.

The Bishop of Limerick has resumed his tour of confir-  
mation in the parish churches of this diocese.

The Rev. Mr. Locke, of Newcastle, has again availed him-  
self of the protection of the military and civil powers in  
collection of a large amount of tithe arrear due to him.—  
Operations had been suspended during the summer, at the  
suggestion of a principal executive officer of Government, in  
order to accommodate the tithe payers. This unmerited  
indulgence, however, did not produce a successful result, and  
Mr. Locke has been again compelled to resort to compulsory  
measures. We have been assured on the best authority that  
there is not a doubt of his complete success, for his resolute  
determination to assert his just rights is as manifest as his  
previous lenity has been. Landlords may yet acknowledge  
their obligation to such men for boldly standing forward in  
defence of the outworks of property. If tithe was conceded  
to popular threats in the extensive and frequently troubled  
district of which Mr. Locke's parishes form the greater part,  
we are firmly persuaded that rents would be endangered.—  
Mr. Smith, the police magistrate, and Mr. Langford,  
although belonging to a neighbouring district, are the magis-  
trates in attendance.
