Mr. Bennett, held an inquest this week at the residence of Maurice Finn, who was barbarously murdered last Sunday, as related in the Standard. The jury returned a verdict of wilful murder, and the name of the perpetrator eluded justice.

A man employed by a farmer named John Kelly, to make sale of 18 bags of oats, for the distillery, and then absconded, was arrested at Liverpool, and is now confined in the Millmeel gaol.

A man named Kelly living at Ballykelly, was attacked by an armed party of ruffians, and wounded Edmund Kelly, who received a ball in the thigh, and Kelly, was dreadfully beaten by the ruffians.—On the night of the 15th, the property of a man named Castlecomer, were maliciously set on fire. The man was suspected of giving information to the ruffians.

Mr. Bennett has resumed his tour of confirmation of this diocese.

ATROCIOUS MURDER.—Wednesday morning an industrious farmer named Daniel M'Inerney, was digging potatoes in his own field at a place called Clogher, near Bruree, when three men entered the enclosure and approached him.—Without any parley one of these fellows suddenly struck him a furious blow of a stone on the head which knocked him down, and the others followed up the attack by striking him on the ground repeated blows of a spade-tree, with such desperate violence that the heavy implement absolutely broke in their hands. The unhappy victim, of this brutal outrage, was disfigured in a most barbarous fashion, and in five minutes they had not left a spark of life in him. The murderers fled immediately after the fatal deed, but we are gratified to learn they are known. An inquest was held by James Bennett, Esq. Coroner, and a verdict of wilful murder returned against persons, whose names for the present it would not be discreet to publish.

Nicholas P. O'Gorman, Esq. the presiding barrister for the county Westmeath, has arrived at Mullingar from Moate, to hold the quarter sessions of that district. There are 18 prisoners (arrested by the police, under the command of George Dobbyn, Esq. C.C.) for trial at these sessions, for offences under the "coercion act," which is at present in force in the baronies of Moyashel and Magheredernan.
