DEATHS.

On Tuesday last, at his house in Kingstown, after a few days' illness, to the deep and lasting regret of an affectionate family, Lieutenant-Colonel William Vincent, eldest son of Arthur Vincent, of Dublin, Esq. an Alderman of this City. During some of the most trying scenes of the Peninsular war, the deceased Officer was in the capacity of Acting Assistant Quarter Master General to the Army, and of late years filled the same situation with eclat in Cork, Clare, and the Dublin district. At the battle of Orthes he distinguished himself in command of the 82d Regiment, and for that affair was honoured with a gold Medal. Few individuals have been consigned to an early grave more generally lamented, because his character stood in high repute as a soldier and a gentleman in the fullest and most correct sense of the word. For the honourable profession of arms he had prepared himself by a capital elementary education, so that his manners and accomplishments won the universal esteem of his brother Officers, while by the men he was uniformly respected and beloved. He was beside in the circle of private life a sincere friend, a fond husband, an excellent son and brother, fulfilling all the relative and social duties with exemplary and undeviating attachment. The nicest principles of rectitude actuated Lieut.-Colonel Vincent upon all occasions, while the more tender feelings of humanity always found an echo in his good and gallant breast.—His remains were interred at an early hour on Thursday morning at Monkstown Church-yard, Dublin, attended by his truly sorrowing relatives and friends.
