The Lord Lieutenant has offered £50 reward for the party of men who recently attacked the house of William Crough, parish of Doone, in this County, and fired shots into it—also, £100 reward for Andrew Fleming, who murdered his brother near Newtownbutler, by shooting him.

The old house of Ballymacprior, on the bank of the river Laune, near Killorglin, Kerry, which, with the farm on which it stands, has, for some time past, been in the tenancy of Connolly O'Neil, Esq. was Tuesday night, burned to the ground, supposed maliciously.

On Thursday last a fine boy, only son of Thomas Kingmill, Esq. of Templemore, unfortunately lost his life under the following melancholy circumstances:—The family had been sitting in the parlour, when a young lady took an old gun, through play, not knowing it to be loaded, and presented it at the boy; it missed fire several times, till it at length exploded and the contents lodged in the child's head—he died instantly.

On Saturday last John Gihespie, a collector of toll at the bridge of Londonderry, fell down in the toll-house, and instantly expired.

Peggy Hanrahan, aged 60, living in Garryowen, while sitting by a fire on Tuesday evening last, became suddenly weak and having fallen into the fire was so dreadfully burnt, that she died in twenty-four hours after the accident in Barrington's Hospital.

The Treasurer of Barrington's Hospital acknowledges from the Magistrates of Petty Sessions, thirty-one pounds twelve shillings, fines towards the funds of that institution.
