The energy and usefulness of his religious labours, and the amiableness of his private deportment might indeed revive recollections of other departed Ministers of Christ; but within memory no man has descended to the grave, called so suddenly from his labours in the vigour of youth and health.

The sense of a loss so nearly touching all classes of the public, joined to the esteem and regard for this pious and talented young Clergyman, were strongly evinced from Cork by upwards of one hundred carriages, beside a greater number of fellow citizens than were seen assembled on such melancholy occasions.
