A man of the name of O'Brien, a school-master, was
yesterday apprehended for an attempt to commit a capital
offence on the person of a little girl. This is the second time
the prisoner appears in custody to answer a similar charge.

A man of the name of Coffey is committed to Tralee gaol,
on suspicion of the murder of his wife and child.

Saturday evening, two factions met in a desperate
encounter near Pallasgrean, where in a furious and bloody
conflict the Magrath party retreated, and fled into several
houses for shelter, the windows of which their assailants
destroyed.

Monday last, a boy of the name of John Donohue, who
was driving a horse for a load of hay in Mr. D'Arcy's lawn,
near Newcastle, fell out, and the wheel of the car passed over
his head, which inflicted a most desperate wound—his life is
in imminent danger. On the evening of same day, a man
of the name of Sheahan, in a state of intoxication, was
returning home from a funeral with a brother-in-law of his
named Hallinan. Sheahan rode a spirited horse and accom-
panied Hallinan, who was also in liquor, to the Newcastle
Pike. On his return the horse threw him, and he fell upon
his head, was taken into a house on the road side, laid on
some straw in the kitchen, where he immediately expired.
Sheahan has left a wife, near her confinement, and three
children. He was a farmer in comfortable circumstances;
and his untimely death should be a warning to whiskey
drinkers.

At Newcastle Petty-Sessions on Saturday, the Magistrates
granted informations against John and Gerald Fitzgerald,
Patrick Sheahan, Thomas Mullane, John Hara and Patrick
Quin, for riot in the town and breaking windows. At the
prosecution of the police, informations were ordered by the
Bench, against several of the leaders in the disgraceful riot
on the last fair day of Newcastle, described in the CHRONICLE
of Saturday.

A servant boy of Captain Studdert, R.N. Kilrush, who was
charged with intoxication by one of his fellow-servants,
attempted suicide last week by cutting his throat with a knife.
The unfortunate boy is likely to recover.
