During the violent gales of last week, a poor woman, wife of an industrious tradesman of Cahersaveen, was blown into

a lough and smothered.

The Albion, of Carlisle, Thomas Ryan, master, from Limerick, laden with wheat, struck the outside of Corragarone, Galway coast, on the night of Thursday the 26th ult. and immediately sunk. All the crew perished, and 4 or 5 bodies have come into one creek at Terbut Island. The stern of the boat having the vessel's name painted on it. with some handspikes, reached the shore. Corragarone rock lies near the entrance of Ardbear bay, (on which if there was a light) this melancholy accident would not have occurred, and the vessel now wrecked would have found an easy entrance into Ardbear bay, which is scarcely a mile from where the vessel struck and sunk.
