Ireland, who were put aside by the Lord Lieutenant.

day's polling—by a majority of 1092 over the Provost's son,
Mr. George Mills.
At a late hour yesterday evening, a farmer named Patrick
Foley, of Castlebank, near this City, on his way home from
Ardnacrusha, fell into a small stream adjoining his own farm,
and was there suffocated. He was brother to the Parish
Priest of Shanagolden, in this County.
Egan, for the murder of Mr. William Carter, at Ballyfinn,
has been taken at Castle-Otway, Nenagh, and is committed
to Maryboro' gaol.
Saturday evening, Mr. Murphy, Excise Officer of Athy,
with a party of the Revenue Police, proceeded to Ballylinan,
where they seized 100 barrels of malt. They were through
the village in search of cars, when a large concourse of peo-
ple attacked them, one of the Police was knocked down by a
blow of a stone; some shots were then fired, one of which
unfortunately took fatal effect by killing a woman, in her
own house, the ball having passed through a window and
penetrated her neck. The further progress of the affray was
stopped by the interference of the constabulary at Ballylinan.
An inquest was held on the following day, when a verdict of
Wilful Murder was returned. Two of the Revenue Police,
charged with the offence, are committed to Maryboro' gaol.
Tuesday night an out-house, the property of Michael
Tracey, was maliciously set on fire on the lands of Kilawardy,
within two miles of Templemore, and within half a mile of
the police station at Killea, and totally consumed: there
were six head of black cattle, two horses and a foal, all of
which were burned.
