Several panes of glass were broken in the Club House, on  
Saturday night, by miscreants who flung stones from the  
street.

Sunday last the Mayor held an inquest upon the body of  
Ellen Richardson, who was found dead at a house in Brown's  
Lane, under circumstances which demanded enquiry. The  
deceased was a clever comely woman of about 30 years, and  
had, it appears, followed from Chatham to this garrison an  
Officer's servant in the 94th Regiment, to whom she bore a  
strong attachment. She left her lodging early on Saturday  
last, and said she was going to the Doctor's for the strongest  
dose she could get, and threatened to be the blackest sight to  
James Sutcliffe he ever saw. The unfortunate woman had  
been drinking to excess the day before. The inmates were  
alarmed at finding her sick on Saturday evening, when she  
had violent vomiting, and died about 9 o'clock same night.  
Under her bed was found a paper with sugar of lead, marked  
in writing, Poison. Surgeon Thwaites made a post mortem  
examination, and found in the stomach an ounce of arsenic.  
Verdict—Death by taking poison in a state of temporary  
mental derangement.

Friday last, after serving eight tythe subpoenas, in the  
parish of Pallas-Grean, the Rev. Mr. Scott's three sons, two  
other young gentlemen, and his driver, were assailed by a  
mob of men, women and children, who pelted them with  
stones, and shouted them with fiendlike yells, to his very  
lawn. The Rev. Mr. Scott's eldest son had his gun broken  
in his hand from a stone, and his younger was hit in the  
head and two more places: their guns were charged, one  
barrel with shot and the other with bullets. The Rev. Mr.  
Scott's directions were to retire if attacked; they were  
obliged to do so, being frequently pressed by the mob within  
ten yards, and in self-defence fired their shot barrels three  
times to keep the assailants from heading them; there were  
three persons slightly wounded, but no serious injury had  
occurred at either side, and the object to substantiate service  
has been effected. They are some of the people known, but  
there is little use in looking to them, as they are unfortunate  
tools for others, who suffer such things to occur without the  
protection of the proper authorities. The assailing party,  
who were in close array, consisted of between 2 and 300,  
and there were as many more at a distance gathering forces.  
The pursuit was nearly 2 miles home, the Rev. Mr. Scott's

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
