Yesterday, aged 71, at his seat, Ballycarr, John Colpoys, Esq. formerly Major Clare Militia,—a gentleman of the most accomplished manners combined with Christian principles,—he was a sincere and faithful friend, humane and charitable to the poor, who have cause to lament him, as well as his numerous friends to regret his loss. He was an indulgent landlord, an upright Magistrate.—He died relying only on the blood and righteousness of the Lord Jesus Christ.

This incident is a source of sincere regret to a large circle of friends and relatives, and it has changed one of the happiest homes into a house of mourning and affliction, of which language can give no adequate portraiture.—The deceased has left eight young children to deplore a loss which to them may be truly said to be irreparable. She was one of the best and most amiable of women in all the relations of life. The deceased Lady was the Belle of Limerick some years ago.
